

Some of the highest moments of my faith journey were the low moments of my life, times when I fell on my face, made the worst choices, felt the deepest pain of regret and despair, loneliness, and sadness, times when I was just plain weary. Through those experiences I know the strength of God's forgiving love, saving and renewing me ... redefining my life with love.

The community of the church enables us to share the moments of our lives ... those that tear us up and those that put us back together. What is saving your life today? How is your life being redefined by love? How is Christ Church being redefined by God's love?

Dear Friends,

Thirty-eight years ago my wife said the last thing she would ever be was the spouse of a pastor. And now I must say in public that if not for her love and understanding, I would not have found ministry exciting and exhilarating. Our children have added joy and blessing to my ministry most of the time. I couldn't have asked for a more supportive family.

Each pastor brings with him or her a variety of gifts and graces. Even though I've enjoyed every aspect of the church's ministry, my specialty has always been that of providing pastoral care. I was well-grounded in this skill from my seminary days. So I always counted it as a privilege to be with people during their emotional highs and lows, and in the most memorable moments of their journeys — baptisms, confirmations, marriages, hospitalizations, and most importantly, at deaths and during the time of bereavement. My style of leadership has never been glittery, showy, and forceful. For those who expected that aspect of leadership in me, I would have been a disappointment. I know that I am a nurturing enabler.

And my last word in this last page is to you. Thanks for your wholehearted support in all our church-related endeavors during these four years. I compliment you for finding the resources for renovating the parsonage, upgrading the pipe organ, making the cosmetic improvements in the Wesley Room, and creating a new Gathering Space in Crafts Hall. The 60-year celebrations you put on for the church will always be memorable.

Keep up the good work. Love life. Love God in all circumstances. Love your community. Be passionate about people. Don't waver in your loyalty to Christ Church.

Central City Café is located in Durham Memorial AME Zion church in Buffalo. It is open five days each week offering hot lunches and community support services for over 100 people daily. The café has been open for about 25 years, and Christ Church has been involved with it since its inception. We've prepared hundreds of casseroles and served hundreds of meals – but this

month we are changing the day that we will be serving. Our **new** day will be the first Tuesday of the month from 9:00-1:00, and any amount of time would be appreciated! It is our hope that this day will be convenient for more people to get involved. If you want to help out, please sign up in Crafts Hall. Our next Share a Meal for Central City is May 8, so please take a pan home with you, prepare the casserole, and return it to church on May 15. The Café is also in need of ground coffee, sugar, and plastic spoons and forks.



The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) has partnered with the United Church of Christ in Japan (UCCJ) and first-responder GlobalMedic to bring immediate relief to communities in Japan affected by the 9.0 magnitude earthquake and tsunami. It is still winter in

STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE 1ST QUARTER REPORT

Through March 31, 2011, we have 110 pledging units for total general operations pledges of \$211,058. Our budget is based on an anticipated \$216,000 of general operations pledges. Total anticipated income is \$277,000 and anticipated expenses total \$324,690.

Eight pledging units have fully paid 2011 pledges, totaling \$15,550.

 $25~\mbox{units}$ are behind in their pledges — a shortage of \$4,217.

Our Total Income from all sources as of March 31 was \$88,091 and our General Operations Expenses for that period were \$70,787.

We've paid \$5,346 toward our 2011 apportionments of \$42,771.
