May we live in such a way and proclaim in such a way that through Jesus our lives and our communities will be transformed and truly become places of God's shalom.

HERE'S A WAY TO ENHANCE YOUR BIBLE READING: Try keeping a Journal. Sometimes, when you are reading, something in the reading will speak to you or stand out to you. Take a moment and write down the SCRIPTURE. Then make an OBSERVATION (what spoke to me??). Thirdly, ask "How would I APPLY this to my life. Finally, make what you learned into a PRAYER. This method of bible reading is called the S.O.A.P. method and allows us to ask "how will I be different because of what I just read?"

Parting Thought

How quickly things can change. I was reading Dr. Mark Zimmerman's account of being in Kathmandu when the earthquakes hit Nepal. He was in church with his family when the quake hit (his family is fine and the hospital suffered only marginal damage in the quake). I wondered how I would respond to all of the shaking and quaking. I was reading about the "peaceful protest" that was going to be held in Baltimore following the funeral of an African American man who died in police custody and saw how quickly a peaceful protest can become an angry mob (and I wondered about how close to the surface rage lives in me). These rapid changes are not new. Remember the very crowd what was calling out "Hosanna!" on Palm Sunday as Jesus arrives in Jerusalem is calling out "Crucify Him!" just 5 days later. Life can be unpredictable and life has frequent sudden changes. I was meeting with a congregation in Syracuse last night . . . they were quite subdued because a 62 year old member of the church had died quite suddenly earlier in the afternoon. Life has a way of suddenly intervening in our routines and our expectations. A life of faith in Jesus Christ does not protect us from the sudden changes and impact from the world around us. Jesus does not promise us a "safe" life. Jesus does not promise us a "comfortable" life. Preachers who say such things are not telling the truth. Jesus does promise us a life with meaning – in all of its phases. We find meaning in rushing to help earthquake victims. We find meaning in working to end systemic racism AND the violent responses. We find meaning in trusting in a God who never leaves nor abandons us regardless of the sudden changes that impact and surround us. One hymn says it best, "On Christ the solid rock I stand, all other ground is sinking sand, all other ground is sinking sand." Even if the solid bed rock of earth is shaking, even if the solid bed rock of a stable society is being shaken, I stand firm in who I am called to be and from that firm and solid place I work for peace and understanding and justice and mercy and grace.
