Hi Everyone:

I read this morning that a 90-year-old holocaust survivor was arrested for protesting the situation in Ferguson, Missouri. I am not an expert on race relations, interreligious dialogue, or the imbalance of wealth and poverty in the United States. I am a Christ follower. I don't think purely human solutions will

ever right the wrongs of our society or any human society. It is easy to watch violence around the world, around our own country and around town and despair. Or, what would be worse, to oversimplify both the problems and the solutions. Saying, "why don't we all just get along" or "live and let live" or "they should get over it" does not address the underlying injustice (or the experience of injustice) that pervades the lives of so many human beings. For example, the typical human response to the current blow-up in Ferguson, MO reveals once again the deep racial divide in our country. On the one side there are attempts to justify the shooting of an unarmed man six (6) times. On another side there is the airing of unjust grievances that date back generations. On still another side is an attempt to address the underlying socioeconomic and historic narrative. On still another side are those who would take advantage of the pain and struggle of others for their own grandstanding, ratings, personal fame and fortune. I am convinced that purely human solutions cannot work. Unless the human heart is changed (and, I am convinced, that change only comes by the power of the Holy Spirit through a committed relationship with Jesus Christ) and we begin to see every human being as a creature of divine worth and deplore every act of violence, there is no way out of these deadly patterns. When I became a Christ follower I did not know the whole story. I thought becoming a follower of Christ was all about the meeting of my needs, my pain, my guilt, etc. As I matured in the faith and began to more deeply read the gospels and the teaching of Jesus, I began to seriously consider what living life in the Kingdom of God might look like. Jesus was not saving me, Jesus was investing me in bringing Kingdom values to all that I am and all that I do. At that point I realized that I had to make a commitment to making this a better planet and working for justice for all persons. I suspect this is the kind of thing Jesus was talking about when he spoke about "counting the cost" of discipleship.
