Parting Thought

On a Silent Night in a tiny town in an insignificant back eddy of the great Roman Empire a male baby was born. His parents were nobody, really. A young woman, Mary, and her betrothed, Joseph. Joseph could claim a distant lineage to King David but those days were centuries removed; little remained of the former glory in the life of this simple carpenter. Other than a group of shepherds and the animals in the shelter Joseph and Mary were using, the only witnesses to this birth were the parents and a single star in the dark Middle Eastern night. From the perspective of the mighty empire, from the perspective of the seats of power, from the perspective of the wealthy and mighty (with the exception of crazy King Herod), the birth was unnoticed and would have been considered insignificant and largely irrelevant - just another peasant mouth to feed. Rumors of angels and choirs in the night and exotic visits of scholars from faraway lands would not have changed the view of this event from the perspective of the seats of power. It didn't happen in a palace, the parents were nobody, really, and the troubled land of Palestine was of minimal political importance. What difference would one baby, more or less, make in the big wide world? But great change begins in small ways. Mighty invasions begin with a single event. The world transformed and began with a single baby. On a Silent Night in a tiny town in an insignificant back eddy of the mighty Roman Empire the renewal of the world (and my life and your life) began with the birth of a baby. His name is Jesus.
