16. SHOES Christ United Methodist Church Launches Shoe Drive to Support Microenterprise in Developing Nations, and Help the Environment

The public is invited to Make A Difference by donating used shoes February 18 – May 18

Christ United Methodist Church is conducting a shoe collection drive on February 18 – May 18 to benefit small business ventures in developing nations and keeping old shoes out of local landfills. Individuals can help by donating used shoes at Christ Church.

In the US alone, approximately 630 million pairs of shoes are thrown away per year. The materials used to manufacture a pair of shoes are created from chemical compounds that create health hazards when left to disintegrate openly or in landfills. By donating your used shoes to the Shoe Drive, your shoes are given a second chance to make a difference. All donated shoes will be redistributed to microenterprise partners and used in developing nations for impoverished people to start, maintain, and grow a unique business opportunity to feed, clothe, and house their families. The additional advantage of this shoe collection is diverting shoes from the waste stream and landfills and creating commerce and sustainability in peoples' lives. The shoe drive is just one part of Christ Church's annual "Make A Difference" Day, which takes place on Sunday, May 18. On site will be trucks collecting kitchen appliances for Habitat for Humanity, household goods to benefit Journey's End refugee resettlement, clothing for Asbury Shalom Zone located on the west side of Buffalo and a Shred-It truck provided by our community partner, Allaire Financial Strategies. Bring your old files and papers to be shredded onsite in a safe secure manner.

Members of the community are invited to make a difference in the lives of others by donating items no longer needed or wanted. Parting Thought:

Ah, Valentine's Day. Hearts and flowers and chocolates and dinner out; a modern American celebration of romance. The cultural pressure from all the advertising would seem indicate that unless you have someone you are romantically connected to you aren't worth bothering with. It would seem to indicate that the only way show love and affection is through expensive and/or perishable gifts. Even so, I am reminded that even in the romantic songs the desire to pledge faith and to make binding promises is very strong. Somehow Valentine's Day on the same weekend as we examine the fruit of the spirit called Faithfulness has to be the work of God. St. Valentine was not a celebrant of "romance." He was incarcerated and later martyred for assisting Christians enduring persecution and for performing marriages (when it was illegal to do so). It is widely believed that the association with romance began in the time of Chaucer and is linked to an early English belief that mid February was the time that the birds began their pairing. What would love look like if romance was paired with this week's fruit of faithfulness. Yes we would seek to rekindle our relationships and yes we would seek to "spice up" our marriages but the underlying value would be "keeping faith" with one another.

How would this look if we applied faithfulness to all of our relationships? How would this look for all of us (not just the "paired" or "married")? What would it look like if every one of us chose to be truth keepers and truth tellers and were faithful in all our dealings? I believe the fruit of the spirit we call Love when paired with Faithfulness produces healthy, vital and transformational relationships.
