Hi Everyone:

Another Tuesday, another cold February morning, another few inches of snow – Western New York in winter. We are now in the "depths" of winter. We are half way between the winter solstice and the vernal equinox. Statistically the last week of January and the first week of February are the coldest (on average) of the year and this week is working very hard to keep the average numbers down. It is, quite naturally, part of the cycle of life for we who live in the north. Our ancestors worked very hard for 9 months to lay in provisions, wood, food, etc. so they could survive the winter and early spring. I don't have to do that because I have

Wegman's, but there is a deep desire in me to hunker down next to a roaring fire and read some good books and do some writing. I'm leaving the roaring fire out of the equation but am in the middle of an ambitious reading plan. I tend to read "horizontally", that is when I find an author that I like I will read everything I can find by him/her. I am currently plowing my way through half a dozen books by Dallas Willard and trying to implement the choices and changes in my spiritual practices that he is recommending. Winter can be a time of waiting or it can be a time of preparation for what is to come. How will you use our "hunkering down" time this season?

Here is what is happening at Church:

- 1. Last Sunday's attendance was about 115. We celebrated communion and learned more of how our transformed lives in Christ produce a very different way of living and set of values by which we live.
- 2. This Sunday I am beginning Chapter 6 of Matthew and a discussion of the inner life. We have learned that the Kingdom of the Heavens is not a new set of rules and laws to follow. We have learned that Jesus came to make us not only new people but a new kind of people. This newness is worked from the inside out. It is developed in us through our surrender to the life of Jesus and choosing to place ourselves in the presence of God's grace. In a way the spiritual disciplines are the cure/treatment for our brokenness. The only way to be a life transformed is to regularly get as close to the source of that life as we possibly can.

HERE'S A WAY TO ENHANCE YOUR BIBLE READING; Try keeping a Journal.
Sometimes when you are reading something in the reading will speak to you or stand out to you. Take a moment and write it down the SCRIPTURE. Then make an OBSERVATION (what spoke to me??). Thirdly, ask "How would I APPLY this to my life. Finally, make what you learned into a PRAYER. This method of bible reading is called the S.O.A.P. method and allows us to ask "how will I be different because of what I just read?"

Parting Thought

I am nearly finished reading Dallas Willard's The Great Omission. In chapter 10, while discussing the modern tendency to emphasize "Right profession" as all that was required to be identified as a Christian, Dr. Willard wrote "This has now produced generations of professing Christians, who, as a whole, do not differ in character, but only in ritual, from their non-professing neighbors; in addition, a massive population has now arisen in America who believe in God, even selfidentify as spiritual, but will have nothing to do with the churches – often as a matter of pride. What has in other days been called "nominal" Christianity now becomes "normal" Christianity, even among those whose tradition had prided itself in not being just nominal Christians (page 110)." The farther along this journey I travel the more I am convinced that the number one need of the American Christian movement is deep people. Many of our churches are bemoaning the lack of numbers – declining attendance, declining participation – but I believe these are symptoms of a greater disease in the American form of Christianity. The core problem (the disease), in me, in us, in the institutional church as a whole, is a profound shallowness of spirit. I want to find others who want to go deep. I want to find others who want to commit together to pray, to study, to engage the classic spiritual disciplines so that we can, in the name of Jesus Christ, transform the world.

I am hopeful, BJ Norrix, lead servant, coach, troublemaker
