5 Marks of a Christian

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A word from Pastor Darryl

"Remember your Baptism and be thankful," is often used in worship as we did last Sunday to remind us of our baptismal covenant to reach out to the needs of human beings in the depths of God's love. I introduced a book by Rowan Williams, former Archbishop of Canterbury, titled "Being Christian: Baptism, Bible, Eucharist, Prayer." Jim Pollard used this book last fall in the Sunday morning adult study group.. If you missed this study, you missed a treat! (As a side note, I encourage us to join Jim on Sunday at 10 am for a current conversation on "the Five Marks of a Methodist"). Archbishop Williams says, "...the Church came to view baptism as a kind of restoration of what it is to be truly human. To be baptized is to recover the humanity that God first intended." "What did God intend?" He asked. Williams says, "God intended that human beings should grow

into such love for God and such confidence in God that they could rightly be called God's sons and daughters." But Williams says, "human beings have let go of that identity, abandoned it, forgotten it, or corrupted it. And when Jesus arrives on the scene he restores humanity to where it should be." Then he says this: "but that in itself means that Jesus, as he restores humanity 'from within,' has to come down into the chaos of our human world, Jesus has to come down fully to our level, to where things are shapeless and meaningless, in a state of vulnerability and unprotectedness, if real humanity is to come to birth." He further asked this question: "Where might you expect to find the baptized?" And he says, "one answer is, 'in the neighborhood of chaos,' It means you might expect to find Christian people near to those places where humanity is most at risk, where humanity is most disordered, disfigured, and needy. Christians will be found in the neighborhood of Jesus – but Jesus is found in the neighborhood of human confusion and suffering, defenselessly alongside those in need. If being baptized is being led to where Jesus is, then being baptized is being led towards the chaos and the neediness of a humanity that has forgotten its own destiny." He says, "a baptized Christian ought to be somebody who is not afraid of looking with honesty at the chaos inside, as well as being where humanity is at risk, outside." "So baptism says Archbishop Williams, means being with Jesus 'in the depths': the depths of human need, including the depths of our own selves in their need – but also in the depths of God's love; in the depths where the Spirit is re-creating and refreshing human life as God meant it to be." And so he says, "to be able to say, 'I'm baptized' is not to claim an extra dignity, let alone a sort of privilege that keeps you separate from and superior to the rest of the human race, but to claim a new level of solidarity with other people." Here is my challenge for us: Can we commit to be and to do more of that this year – to claim a new level of solidarity with other people? Williams says, "it is to accept that to be a Christian is to be affected – you might even say contaminated – by the mess of humanity. To put it another way, you don't go down into the waters of the Jordan without stirring up a great deal of mud! As always, I am praying for you and with you daily. May God's love and blessings be always with you, and my love to all of you. Invite someone to join us for worship!
