Hi Everyone:

A friend pointed out a few weeks ago that in the movie series "Back to the Future" when they go forward into the future from 1985 they arrive in 2015. The film maker's imagination of what 2015 might look like is both surprisingly accurate and humorously wrong. They were accurate with split screen televisions and video conferencing. However, we don't have "hover cars" or "hover boards" or self-lacing sneakers. Looking into the future can be a perilous process because life and the social and political forces all around us are highly unpredictable and volatile. Who could have predicted the power of social media even twenty years ago? Understanding the rapidity and fluidity of change is critical when thinking about a church's (or The Church's) future. There are voices that call us to step away or battle the forces of change. There are other voices that call us to embrace the change and "go with the flow." I don't find help or hope in either voice. For the Christ-follower there is always another voice. It is the voice of the One who called us and continues to call us to be faithful. Faithfulness to Jesus means living the life he called us to, sharing the gospel wherever and whenever we can, and striving to make our world a better place. I believe faithfulness dictates that we use

whatever tools are available to us to communicate the Gospel. That means we have to have a presence in the social media world (Facebook, Twitter, Tumblr, Instagram, Linkedin, Pinterest, just to name a few) just as Christians have had to find ways to be present in the media of their times. For the first Christians that place was under the Stoas in the City Center – which was the marketplace, information center, and gathering place of their time. The Reformation Christians utilized the new fangled printing press and 20th Century Christians utilized radio and television to reach people where they were and to communicate the gospel. Today we use the social media tools to communicate and connect and begin conversations that enable us to offer Christ to the world.

Hearts and Hands currently serve over 500 care receivers. More than 300 volunteers are part of the organization, which now employs 4 full time and 4

HERE'S A WAY TO ENHANCE YOUR BIBLE READING; Try keeping a Journal. Sometimes when you are reading something in the reading will speak to you or stand out to you. Take a moment and write it down the SCRIPTURE. Then make an OBSERVATION (what spoke to me??). Thirdly, ask "How would I APPLY this to my life. Finally, make what you learned into a PRAYER. This method of bible reading is called the S.O.A.P. method and allows us to ask "how will I be different because of what I just read?"

Parting Thought

Next week (beginning on the 20th) I am taking a little vacation. Karen and I are flying down to Lakeland, Florida to spend a week in, hopefully, warmer weather and to visit with my parents. We have not taken vacation time since last summer, and we are both feeling it. I had a conversation with some folks the other day about "the Sabbath" and how central it is to the Biblical narrative. The Bible teaches us that taking rest is a holy obligation. When the Hebrews were slaves they got no rest and no time to express their devotion to God. They were worked to death or incapacity at which point they were put

to death. There is no Sabbath rest for slaves. But the 10 commandments are instructions on how to live as free people. All too often we allow ourselves to be so ensnared by our culture's definition of success (bigger, more, newer) that we easily work ourselves into illness, unhappiness, and, yes even death. Pastors, like everyone else, fall into the same trap. The Sabbath principle is not a burden but a gift from God. The principle is very simple: every seventh day you need to do no work. The Biblical understanding is that the Sabbath is Saturday (the seventh day of the week). Christians moved away from Saturday for worship in the first century and chose to worship on the "Lord's Day" or "resurrection day" which is the first day of the week (Sunday). I think the principle should be our deeper understanding: simply rest one in every seven days. Do you take every 7th day to rest and be grateful? Karen and I have had the practice for the past 3.5 years of having our Sabbath on Wednesday – it is the one day each week we have off together. We go to the park, we take long walks, we rest and spend time together, we strive to "do no work." So, our brief vacation - our week of Sabbaths - is January 20 through 27. It is good to periodically detach (completely detach) in order to gain perspective and renewal.
