Hi Everyone:

There was a time in our country when the goals of the church and the goals of the nation seemed to be aligned. Now, as an historian and a theologian, I am not entirely convinced that this was a good thing. Historically, under this arrangement, the church is usually co-opted by the state and loses its passion for Christ. This supportive arrangement has been in a slow death spiral since the end of World War II. In the old "Christendom" way of doing things the church focused on Christian Education. People were considered already Christians, growing up in Christian homes and so the critical work was to educate them in the way of the church and the life of the institution. What we have discovered over the past 50 years is that the church taught and helped to culturally assimilate our younger people but we do not seem to have done a very good job of helping them form and develop vital relationships with God through Jesus Christ. Our Christian life is formed within us.

It is formed through choices (will I follow Jesus, will I try to live my life according to his teaching?); it is formed through practices (disciplines); it is formed through exposure and conversation and deep prayer and a high degree of intentionality. I know from my own experience that who I am tomorrow is determined by the choices I make today. If I want to be a better person, a healthier person, a deeper person then I need to begin to form those things through discipline and intentionality today. What is being formed in you? What are the forces shaping your life? What disciplines are you engaged in that are forming Christ within you and reshaping you into his image and likeness?

Parting Thought:

I have an affinity for paper. There is something about holding a book in my hands and being the first to turn the pages that stirs my soul. I grew up in a Print media culture. I remember the first computers that filled buildings and required punch cards. I remember the year 1981 – the watershed year for computers. Before 1981 there were 1 million computers made and sold in the world. In 1981 Commodore (remember the 64?) sold 1 million computers. This is now a digital age. I was reading this morning that last year was the first year more books were published in digital form (no paper) than were published as printed books. What would Guttenberg think of this development? Did I mention that I like paper and holding books? But my preference is rooted in my own history and experience and the world is increasingly peopled by individuals who grew up in a fully digital age. It is not a question of right or wrong, good or bad, it is the complicated matter of the world changing rapidly around us. I like paper but I have learned to communicate digitally: I send this e-mail, I have a face book page and a twitter account and I even keep a blog – none of which requires paper, books, holding a pen or pencil or any of the things that are first nature to me. But I do it so that I can communicate. In Uganda I am learning the Lugandan language. It is tough sledding but it is allowing me to understand and communicate better as a pilgrim in a strange land. I communicate digitally for the same reason. It is becoming the language of our society and of our world. I still like paper and books . . . but, for the sake of the Gospel, I will learn the tools of the time. How far are we willing to go to communicate the good news of Jesus Christ to a broken and alienated world?
