A word from Pastor Darryl

Last Sunday we continued our Epiphany sermon series reflecting on the "First Words" Jesus shared in his hometown at his home synagogue. Jesus opened the scriptures and read from the book of the prophet Isaiah: "*The Spirit of the Lord is upon to set everything on earth right, giving relief to the poor, ending oppression, setting free those who were held captive by systems of injustice, and saving all people from the consequences of their sins. Today this scripture is fulfilled in your hearing.*" When Jesus quoted Isaiah he "Moved the Margins." Jesus didn't simply repeat the old promise the way Isaiah and Ezekiel had done. Jesus updated the promise, in modern day language "he updated the version, perhaps to Windows 10." Jesus was saying that it wasn't just a promise about a particular group of people being set free from the circumstances of their lives. It was a promise from God for All People. Jesus was also saying that the promise was not just

something to be remembered as God's promise. It was a course of action that God was taking place right then and there, and for every generation. Jesus lived on "the margins" in his hometown and "Moved the Margins" to include all people, and hence invited hostile crowds to want to edge him out of existence. Today the church wants to edge Jesus out of our worship anytime the margins are made too wide and include too many who are not like us. That is why he upset people so much in his hometown: in his life he dragged the margin boundaries of race, creed, and color to include all people. He dragged the margin boundaries when he gave a common meal, which we have made a holy meal symbolic of his inclusive love for all people. Jesus is dragged to the edge of a cliff to be put out of the lives of his townspeople because no one wants the margins of daily living to be inclusive of strangers. The amazing good news that Jesus shares is for everyone, from those are fortunate to live privileged lives to those caught on the margins – on the other end of systems of oppression and injustice that humankind has created and we all participate in. Those who live with privilege need to hear it as much as those who live with less, so that we all will be compelled to take our relationship with God seriously. So let us indeed be God's people, repenting of our sins, and "accepting the year of our Lord's favor" as Jesus continues to "Move the Margins," the margins of our lives, and asking us to move the margins in Snyder, to streets and avenues outside of the Snyder margins as we explode in love and service. It wasn't easy for Jesus at home and it might not be easy for us. As always, I am praying for you and with you daily. May God's love and blessings be always with you, and my love to all of you. Invite someone to join us for worship!
