Hi Everyone:

How do you change the world? Politics and ideologies aside, most of us would agree that the world in which we live is in need of change and of more love and grace. Pete Seeger, who died last night, believed he could change the world though folk songs. Whether he was singing at union rallies in the 1930's or college campuses in the 1960's or on the Hudson River in the 80's Mr. Seeger wrote, sang and taught music that encouraged fairness and justice for all. Married for nearly 70 years, Mr. Seeger encouraged generations of musicians and challenged the rest of us to ask better questions and to work together to make the world a better place for everyone. Some of his best known songs include "We shall overcome", a song adapted from earlier spirituals that became the anthem of the civil rights movement. "Where have all the flowers gone?" a song that was sung at many anti Vietnam war rallies in the 60's and early 70's. "If I had a hammer" which is a call

to fairness and justice. His songs were adapted and played by a multitude of others (and still are). He also wrote playful songs and children's songs and songs about life and songs to sing along the way. His concerts were sing-a-longs and little mini music festivals. His obituary in the New York Times concluded with the following: Through the years, Mr. Seeger remained determinedly optimistic. "The key to the future of the world," he said in 1994, "is finding the optimistic stories and letting them be known." What if, fellow Christ followers, we chose to tell the most optimistic story ever told in our music, through our lives and in all we do?

Parting Thought:

I was reading a brief essay by that famous British Theologian and philosopher Bono about the difference between Karma and Grace. Karma (what goes around comes around, tit for tat, an eye for an eye, you get what you give) is at the heart of religion. If you are good enough, if you do enough, somehow the universe (God) rewards you in this life and the next. If you are not good enough, if you do not do enough, it will not end well. Most of us, in our subconscious thinking, believe this. That is Karma. Jesus introduced an idea that was so profoundly revolutionary we try to ignore it or often give lip service to it while still living our lives as if Karma were the truth. Jesus idea is expressed in single word: Grace. Grace means I don't get what I deserve. Grace means that all of the crap of my life and of the cumulative lives of every human is now covered and forgiven. I have done some pretty stupid things, hurtful things, unloving things in my life's journey. No amount of "being good" will ever balance the cosmic ledger. The outrageous idea Jesus came to proclaim was that we are already loved, we are already forgiven, we are already freed from the need to be good enough – the ledger has been overbalanced in our favor by Grace. The bad news, from the Karma perspective, is that none of us get what we deserve. The good news, from the Grace perspective, is that none of us get what we deserve. I am glad I get to live into Grace and offer, teach, live, encourage, preach, give, Grace to others.
