A Word From The Pastor

A PASTORAL WORD IN THE MIDST OF THE ISSUES OF RACE AND VIOLENCE IN AMERICA

The recent series of shooting of unarmed black males and targeted shootings of police officers providing escort to peaceful demonstrators have left us deeply shaken. The Rev. Dr. Marvin McMickle, President of Colgate Rochester Crozer Divinity school, writing in the Rochester Democrat & Chronicle, said," It is one of the worst of times in America. The way out of this "valley of the shadow of death" will only be found when all of us realize that Black Lives and All Lives really do matter.

In a letter to the United Methodist Churches of the Upper NY Conference, Bishop Mark Webb states: "As we pray for the families and loved ones of those who lost their lives, we are reminded that God has called the Church to be light in the midst of darkness, to be salt that seasons the world. We must find ways to increase our ministry of justice. How will we continue to not only speak against, but model the kind of lives that reject racism within our world? How do we support the ones who have offered their lives to protect us, while responsibly speaking out and working for necessary changes within our criminal justice system? How do we within the church show the world around us how to love one another as we engage in dialogue about solutions for the desperation within our world? ...

...As the church, may we have confidence in the work of the Gospel message and may we boldly offer that message to the world. I am reminded of words we find in paragraph 121 of <u>The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church</u>: 'Whenever United Methodism has had a clear sense of mission, God has used our church to save persons, heal relationships, transform social structures, and spread scriptural holiness, thereby changing the world.' May we live our mission together, as we offer Jesus to the world.

Let us not continue to model the broken ways of our societies within the church, but may we offer a different way and offer that different way to those around us, as the truth of Christ changes lives, strengthens individuals and families and offers the promise of transformation.

'He has told you what is good: and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God.'" (Micah 6:8)

Some questions from Sunday's sermon, "What Jesus Came To Do"

When Jesus went to Nazareth at the beginning of his public ministry (Luke 4:16-30) he read from the prophet Isaiah;

The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor.

He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor.

Then he announced to the people gathered in the synagogue, *Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing.*

The people were favorably impressed, until Jesus reminded them that God's blessing is not for believers only, but goes beyond the boundaries of religious belief and tradition.

What hard questions does this incident in Jesus' life and ministry generate for our ministries in the 21st century? Rev. Jim Pollard offered the following:

For us, for you, for me – are there people, individuals, groups, who are outside the boundaries we have set, which, if we knew that God's blessing and grace had been given to them, would cause us to be enraged?

Do we believe that we can set limitations of nation, church group, or race on God's grace?

Do we accept and seek to live out the radical inclusiveness of the Gospel? Are we seeking to grow into that inclusiveness?

Does Jesus love us only when we accept him as Savior or before we accept him as Savior? How does our answer to that question affect how we relate to others who do not accept and follow his life and teachings? Does Jesus withhold his blessings from them?

How do our answers to these questions affect our everyday behavior toward the people of our own community? About our attitudes and opinions of people of other religions, races, neighborhoods, nationalities, gender identity?

As Jesus' disciples in the faith community known as Christ UMC, can we reach beyond the boundaries that have been created and be a part of what Jesus came to do?
