I have been thinking a lot about the events of 10 years ago. I vividly remember watching the live news feed and seeing the first tower collapse behind the news commentator before he was even aware of it. I remember concern for the lives of extended family and friends who worked in the World Trade Center (and nearby) and the Pentagon. I remember the anger and rage that was openly expressed and the deep sorrow, grief, and fear the lay just below the surface for many of us.

There was a United Methodist Men's retreat at Camp Casowasco scheduled for the weekend after 9/11 that year and the featured speaker was an Airline Pilot with Southwest. Obviously, he was unable to attend (planes were still grounded) and I was asked by the leadership of that event to address the assembly of men. I don't remember much of what I said but what I do remember was a caution that we not "overreact" and go charging into places we don't belong and to try to bomb a place back to the "stone age" that has barely left the stone age. It was an uncomfortable conversation but one I still stand by.

As Christians, we are required by our Lord to pause, consider, pray, and reflect before we react. As Christians, we are required to pray for our enemies and (here is the uncomfortable part) to forgive. Forgiveness is not saying what happened didn't matter, or it didn't hurt or that it wasn't horrible. Forgiveness is surrendering my right for vengeance and revenge. I realize that nationally this is profoundly difficult and it is hard to imagine this happening on that level. But individually, we are called to release the anger and vengeance and to pray for those who may be our enemies or who have spitefully used us (see Matthew 5:11ff; 5:43ff; and especially 6:14-15). Even if I am called to military service I am never allowed to hate the other. I am praying that as we approach this significant anniversary we would allow ourselves to examine the why's and wherefore's of the event itself and our response.

I am praying that as a nation and a people, we will find ways to build bridges instead of walls and build understanding instead of hatred and reprisals.
