#### A word from Pastor Darryl

Last Sunday we continued our Lenten journey toward the celebration of Easter Day with our theme of "God as Gardener of Grace and Forgiveness" – reflections on Luke 13:1-9. The people are asking Jesus whether tragedy is God's judgment. Jesus in response tells them a story about who God really is. He tells a story about a vineyard owner, a fig tree, and a gardener. "See this fig tree, it wasn't doing what it was supposed to do. Fig trees are supposed to produce figs, but this tree wasn't. It wasn't following the rules of a fig tree. And so the vineyard owner comes in, angry at the tree for its lack of production, and calls for it to be completely uprooted, chopped up and used for firewood. It was good for nothing. It did nothing but take up space, take nutrients from the soil and waste them, take up the vineyard owner's time. It wasn't doing what it was supposed to do, and the vineyard owner was tired of all the taking. He wanted some making. He needed a fig tree that was a maker, not a taker."

The fig tree is saved by an Unconventional Gardener. God is not the vineyard owner. The vineyard owner is the wisdom of the world. It is the wisdom of the world that measures our value in how good we are, if we are following all the rules, if we are doing what we are supposed to do. How much we can put out for families, our churches, or our communities. It is the wisdom of the world that says if you are not a maker, then you are a taker and good for nothing. God is the Gardener who says 'No' to the wisdom of the world. God is the Gardener whose love rejects the wisdom of the world; proclaims our value not in terms of whether we are doing what we are supposed to be doing, not in terms of what we produce, or what we make or even what we take. Rather God tells us, "All that doesn't matter. What matters is how much I care." And God says I care so much that not only am I not going to send punishment down on us for missteps, not only am I not going to uproot us when life seems to have sapped the life from us, but I am also going to get down there with us, in the dirt, in the manure, in the places where it smells and gets overwhelming. God says, "I care enough to get dirty!" And so as an act of repentance we are encouraged to look at our life and dare to ask the hard questions: Am I stingy with my love for others? Am I withholding forgiveness from old wrongs? Am I so busy making a living that I've forgotten to make a life? Such questions, like the parable of the fig tree, move us towards repentance. So Jesus is the Gardener's passion that is marked for us by great urgency – that says, "don't wait, flourish now!"

As always, I am praying for you and with you daily. May God's love and blessings be always with you, and my love to all of you. Invite someone to join us for worship!

It is with sadness that Bob Snyder and I received the news that Bishop Mark Webb has appointed Pastor Darryl to another church. Based on the recently-concluded pledge drive and in consultation with our District Superintendent Wayne Butler, it has been determined that CUMC can no longer afford a pastor with the seniority credentials and pastoral experience to which we have become accustomed. For this reason, the Bishop has made the decision to appoint Pastor Darryl to a church with better financials and to provide us with a pastor at a lower pay level. Bob Snyder and I will meet with the District Superintendent to discuss the process, events and our needs concerning the appointment of our next pastor. At this time, we do not know who our next pastor will be, but we will endeavor to make this process as transparent as possible as we move forward. However, it is with the understanding that some aspects of the appointment of a pastor are confidential to our SPR Team. Darryl has been our pastor for less than a year but during that time he and I have had many frank discussions in his office and he, Pauline and Emily have been to our home. In short, I and many in this congregation have developed a cordial working and personal relationship and will miss him. We certainly wish Darryl the best as he moves forward and uses his graces and talents for the benefit of another congregation in his continuing service to our Savior. I too will miss Darryl, but I will really miss Pauline and also Emily's cartwheels down the main aisle! I have been raising concerns about our finances for several years. In 2005 we had 186 pledges and we are now at 93. Several years ago, then District Superintendent Natalie Hansen warned us about our payroll getting too big for our budget. Our present payroll is \$200,000. Our pledges equal approximately \$200,000 with a total projected income of \$248,000 for 2016. In conclusion, we have to make adjustments."
