Hi Everyone:

This is Holy Week. The eight days from Palm Sunday through Easter Sunday recall and remember the central events of our faith as Christians. I find it helpful to remember that we walk with Jesus through this week in real time. There are no legendary or fantasy or mythical elements in the story. The journey we walk this week recalls a sequence of events that happened in real time in a real place to real people. Can you see Jesus after Palm Sunday walking back to Bethany each night and returning to Jerusalem to sit on the steps with his disciples and teach any and all who will listen. Can you hear the increasing confrontation between Jesus and those whose livelihood and identity are enmeshed in the religious system as it exists? On Wednesday do you see the furtive figure, one of the twelve, a man named Judas Iscariot? Do you see him sneaking away and approaching the religious elite and taking thirty silver pieces to reveal Jesus "secret hide out"? On Thursday do you see Jesus washing the feet of his followers? Do you see the entourage gathered in a large furnished upper room and remembering the Passover together? Do you hear the conversation (One of you will betray me; which of us is the greatest; are two swords enough)? We follow Jesus into the olive tree garden where the olive press is located (a garden of the olive press – in Hebrew called Gethsemane). We anguish in prayer with Jesus as he faces his final challenge. . . the night becomes a blur: a mob, an arrest, a slave loses then regains an ear, into the dungeon at Caiaphas the High Priest's home, a sham trial, and early in the morning, the journey to the Antonia Fortress and an audience with Governor Pilate. Jesus endures another trial and is condemned to death – to be crucified. They mock him, beat him, force him (and a stranger named Simon) to carry the cross through the market place and outside the city gate to a place of the skull and there he is nailed to a cross and left to die. Mid day Friday he dies. Late Friday a man named Joseph (with help from our friend Nicodemus) gets permission to take the body down. He wraps it, lays it in a nearby tomb, rolls a stone in front of the tomb and everyone goes home... This story would be just another tragic event in the daily life of the Roman Empire except for one last detail: Easter Sunday morning. In the deep gloom of a very dark Friday (that would never be called good without the following Sunday) there comes the hint, the rumor, the impossible hope: it may be Friday . . . but Sunday is coming.

Make space to walk with us this week: HOLY THURSDAY – anointing and Holy Communion at 7:00; GOOD FRIDAY – biblical stations of the cross at NOON and 7:00 p.m.; and, of course, EASTER (Sunday the 31st) at 9:00 and 11:00.

Parting Thought

This week our Jewish friends and neighbors will be observing traditional Passover feast called the Seder. This meal symbolically recalls the events of Exodus and the deliverance of the Hebrew children from slavery in Egypt. The phrasing of the remembering is vitally important. The first time I attended a Seder I was struck with the personalization of the experience. People at the table said "I" was a slave in Egypt: Not we, or they or our ancestors but "I" was a slave in Egypt. Later the language continued with God delivered "Me" and did these things for "Me" – again not us, not them, not our ancestors. This personalization is the key to experiencing the Christian observance of Holy Week. It is one thing to say "for God so loved the world that he gave his son". At that point of understanding it is comfortable and generic and in the realm of theological discourse – isn't it nice that God loves the world. Imagine the Seder level of personalization applied here. It is something very different to acknowledge "for God so loved me that he gave his son. . ." At this point it is an awareness that God loves me! I walk though Holy Week with a keen sense of personal involvement: I am Judas Iscariot - how often have I betrayed my Lord and Savior and for much less than 30 silver pieces. I am Simon Peter in the courtyard denying that I even know this Jesus person. I am Pilate – pronouncing a death sentence for political expedience. I am the mocking soldiers. I am the women weeping along the road – the daughters of Jerusalem. Mel Gibson's movie the Passion of the Christ has some interesting (and very bloody) views of the crucifixion of Jesus. There are two things he got right. The first is that the soldiers do not force Jesus on the cross. Jesus lays down of his own accord. The second is that Mel Gibson, himself, is holding the spike that is being driven through the hand of Christ. I am also the spike holder, the spear driver, the dice rollers. I am Mary and John watching from a distance. I am Joseph and Nicodemus. I am the entourage of Mary coming to the tomb early on Sunday morning. I am the Disciples in shock and awe. This story is my story – it is your story. These events did not just happen for others in another place and time. These events happened for MY redemption; for MY

forgiveness; for MY new life and new possibilities. And, in case you need this point hammered home, for YOU as well.

I'll see you through the valley at the end of the week and the great celebration this Sunday as the church gathers,
