Hi Everyone:

What will the long-term Christ Church legacy be? Will we find ourselves saying we had a great 70 year run and produced many excellent pastors from our congregation? Or will we be able to say we managed to "reinvent" ourselves and once again became a church that is relevant to the world around us and therefore effective at bringing the world to Jesus? I find these questions to be the heart and soul of the struggle within the United Methodist Church. As I mentioned last Sunday, our denomination has been on a long and precipitous decline since its creation in 1968. The national numbers are simply a reflection of our experience at Christ Church and are seen in the stories of once healthy and vibrant churches throughout the country that are now closed or in decline. There are dozens of theories and even more fingers pointing blame (we're too liberal, we're too conservative, we are too anti-this or too pro-that) but the bottom line is pretty basic. Our task from the time of Jesus to today is very simple: go, make disciples of Jesus Christ! The reality is that we are easily sidetracked. There are churches that think their mission is to survive. There are churches that think their mission is to preserve a certain style of worship or leadership or theological understanding. In the grand scheme of things these "shadow missions" end up distracting and redirecting us from our core purpose: Go, make disciples for Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. The question to ponder, as we approach Stewardship Sunday, is not how much money we should be giving to support the ministry of Jesus Christ through Christ Church. The question to ponder is how do we redirect our hearts and minds and attitudes from trying to survive to deciding to thrive. The only way we thrive is by introducing people to Jesus Christ and by helping them live as Christ taught us. Christ Church's mission statement says we are "Living Christ's ways . . ." (which begs the question: "are we living Christ's ways?" What would Jesus say about our attitudes, our priorities the values we use in making decisions?). And we are "exploding with love and service . . ." (and how explosive are we?).

Here is what is happening at Christ Church:

1. Attendance last Sunday was 130. We were reminded that the church, the faith, the Christian life we live was held by others and passed to us and that we hold it for those who are coming after us. We are stewards of our faith.

2. This Sunday is "Stewardship Sunday" and we will be talking about being stewards of our resources. I believe in tithing and have, for the past 24 years, given the first 10% of every pay check (and all other gifts and income) for the ministry of Jesus Christ through the congregation I was serving. In learning to live at this level of generosity I have been blessed beyond description and God has enabled to me see and participate in some wonderful things. In the New Testament tithing does not stand as a LAW but is an invitation to live life generously and with open hands. I have never met anyone who learned to tithe who ever went back to doing less and I have never met anyone who learned to tithe who ever stopped at 10%. I have managed to purchase international plane tickets, support young people on their mission and find a little extra for all of the other mission and ministry projects I come in contact with while giving a tenth of the produce of my life.

The scary truth is that if a typical United Methodist Congregation tithed at the level of the average public assistance grant most congregations would double their annual income. This increase would fund local, national, and global missions and ministries. I don't know that we have been taught all that well and the majority of United Methodists around the country have not learned to be disciplined in their giving.

So, we will talk about money on Sunday. Buckle your seat belts; the preacher has stopped preaching and will begin to meddle.

We celebrate the ministry of Bill and Marg Bauza this Sunday at 9:00 and 10:00 a.m. Bill and Marg have served with our 9:00a.m. worship team for just over three years and have decided it is time to step away and pursue other ministry (that and a grand baby in Chicago). There will be a reception to celebrate Bill and Marg's ministry with us at 10:00 a.m. in Crafts Hall. Come and join me as we express our deepest appreciation for Bill and Marg and their ministry of music and leadership. (They want everyone to know they are not leaving us and will continue in all of the other ministries in which they are engaged).

These funds are used to support Seminaries, our District Superintendent, UMCOR, Global Missions and missionaries, our Bishop, new church development, and my friend Aaron Bouwens the Congregational Development director; just to name a few. These funds help fund hospitals around the world and support the denominational structure. The Annual Conference budget is "apportioned" to the 950 Upper New York Annual Conference congregations based on relative financial strength. It is a vital part of our connection. In 2013 Christ Church paid 61% of our shared ministries and we hope to continue to move toward 100% over the next few years. Your year-end giving and extra gifts around the Holy Days are a significant portion of our reaching these goals. THANK YOU for your support.

Parting Thought

When we speak of Church budgets I refuse to reduce the cause of Christ to a utility bill. The reality is that Christ Church has chosen to be a community center of faith and a resource in our community. We provide a building that houses AA groups, FA groups, musical groups, a counselor, dancers, girl scouts and many many more. We provide a ministry that serves our wider community in dozens of ways (from food to housing to emotional and spiritual support). But these resources and outreach are not the reason we are here – they are the result of a Christian community being located at 350 Saratoga. Christ Church has the mission and purpose of making disciples for Jesus Christ. We have Disciple Classes, we teach our children, we challenge each and every one of us to go deeper, to live deeper, to sacrifice for the cause of the Gospel. We do

this through supporting our staff: Sally Pollard who works with Community life and our education ministries; Kevin Durkin who works to provide meaningful music for our worship gatherings; Janelle Martin who holds the rest of us together by taking care of the administrative details and anchoring the office; Dave Wolf who keeps the place clean and running; Doris Schanzlin who keeps the giving records correct up-to-date and, me. My job as pastor is described in Ephesians 4:11 and following. I am here to equip the saints for the work of ministry to build up the body of Christ. Our staff does its work by helping all of us be better disciples of Jesus Christ and by challenging us to grow and reach out to a lost and hurting world. In my 3 plus years at Christ Church I have become aware of what a great ministry this is and HOW MUCH BETTER we could be if we didn't have worry about every dollar we spend. This Sunday (and forever moving forward) I plan to challenge myself and ALL OF US to step up and do better with our financial support of Christ Church. We are living Christ ways but our exploding in love and service often fizzles because of fiscal restraints. It is time to step up . . .
