Hi Everyone:

I am very excited to be able to spend the end of this week and weekend with my wife and family. My fondest memories of Thanksgiving have to do with my grandmother Norrix's kitchen on Walnut Street in Flat Rock, Michigan. We were blessed to have our grandparents only a few streets away while we were growing up. My first night to sleep away from my parent's and home was at my grandparents' home. On Thanksgiving we all gathered there. Grandpa would set up long wooden planks in the basement to serve as a banquet table and there was always a small card table to the side for the smaller children. Most of the family would gather midday and live in the steam and aroma of a cooking thanksgiving dinner. Thanksgiving memories are little snap shots – my grandmother's back (she was always pulling something out of the oven – rolls, the turkey, pumpkin pies, etc). The men sitting in the living room (and my dad on the stairs) chatting, telling stories, watching the Lions get beat on TV. The women were in the kitchen theoretically helping grandma but generally getting in grandma's way and us kids were floating from place to place or running around outside. At the meal my grandfather would put the first of the food on the kiddie table and then the rest of the adult table. He did this every year. I was nearly an adult when someone (probably my dad) explained that in my grandfather's childhood the children were often fed last and could only eat after the adults were finished. He made sure that we were served first on Thanksgiving, I suspect in response to his upbringing. The day was filled with laughter and bad jokes and stupid puns and occasional hurt feelings and frequent parental intervention into whatever us

kids were into. The day was filled with family (in all its glory and frustration). Grandma died a little over 20 years ago and Grandpa shortly thereafter. None of us live in Flat Rock anymore. The gathering has moved east to Syracuse and Karen and I will go to the next generation – to my sister's – and her four children (and significant others) and the grandchild and we will have a day filled with laughter and bad jokes and stupid puns (hopefully not too many hurt feelings) and we will revel in a day of family. I pray you enjoy and rejoice with those you are gathering with this year.

Parting Thought

Thanksgiving marks the "official" beginning of the "holiday season". I'm not sure who made it official (though I suspect the merchants). One of the things that makes December so hectic and confusing is that we face the annual battle of the competing celebrations. Christmas as the birth of Jesus is an arbitrary date – there is no definitive internal biblical evidence that suggests what time of year Jesus was born. The date was selected because there was a Roman pagan holiday related to the winter solstice already scheduled on that date and the powers that be wanted to eliminate the older event. Clearly this approach didn't work too well and so the celebration of the birth of Jesus finds itself competing with Yule tide, and trees and St. Nicholas and wild drunken revelry that was the feature of some of these older observances. Frankly, the parties are fun the gift giving is fun the competing elements are fun and, for the most part, innocuous. The danger for we Christians is twofold: 1) we forget this older history and get upset when people are celebrating one of the competing traditions (the whole keep Christ in Christmas argument). It really doesn't matter what others are doing, what matters is we celebrate the Feast of the Incarnation (the original title for the December 25 Christian celebration); 2) we get so caught up in the competing traditions that we forget Jesus, and relegate the celebration of his coming to an afterthought or no thought or as something that strikes a jarring note in our parties. Remember to walk slowly through the next 6 weeks and remember Jesus, above all else, remember Jesus...
