Hi Everyone:

It is election day, make sure you exercise your right and privilege to vote.

Election day aside we are gearing up to help with the cleanup efforts on the US East coast. This past Sunday we collected \$650 for the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR). Every dollar sent through UMCOR goes to the relief effort (all of UMCOR's overhead is paid through our Shared Ministries and connection giving.) Send the checks to the church and mark them UMCOR or Hurricane relief. We are also collecting materials for flood buckets – see information below. I want to give a special appreciation to **our YOUTH GROUP** who took the flood bucket information I shared on Sunday morning this week and went out and put a flood bucket together – it is outside my office. Way to lead and well done Christ Church youth!! Wendy Johnson is travelling to the New York City area to help with clean up efforts. There are teams from our area that are heading to Pennsylvania to help with the supply chain of relief and clean up materials. Watch for opportunities to help.

Here is what is happening at Church:

1. Attendance last Sunday was 146. Thank you Sally Pollard and all of our candle lighters who helped make our All Saints Memorial Communion a time of remembering and celebrating the lives of those who have gone before us. Thank you Tammy Mugel and the communion servers!

Thank you Christ Church choir and Elizabeth Holt Curtis for the special music that encourages us in our grief.

2. This Sunday I am speaking from 2 Corinthians 3 and 4 a message titled "With unveiled faces in jars of clay". We reflect the glory of God in flawed human vessels. It is one of the more marvelous things about the Christian journey – it is one of the more frustrating things about the Christian journey. . .

#### 5. HURRICANE RELIEF

FLOOD CLEANING BUCKETS (value approximately \$55) – these help home owners clean up after the flood.

**5 Gallon bucket with re-sealable lid** -- Buckets from fast food restraints or bakeries can be used if washed and cleaned. Do not use buckets that have stored chemicals such as paint or pool cleaner. Advertisements on the outside are acceptable. Here is what goes into a flood bucket:

Liquid laundry detergent – two 25 oz. or one 50 oz bottles only. Liquid household cleaner – 12-16 oz. liquid cleaner that can be mixed with water. No spray cleaners. Dish Soap – 12-28 oz. bottle any brand. 1 can air freshener -- aerosol or pump. 1 insect repellant spray -- 6-14 oz. aerosol or spray pump with protective cover. 1 scrub brush – no toilet-bowl brushes. Plastic or wood handle ok – no kitchen or dish brushes. 18 cleaning wipes – handi wipes, or reusable wipes. NO terry cleaning towels – remove packaging. 7 sponges – removed from wrapper. No cellulose sponges due to mold issue. 5 scouring pads – remove from wrapper – no Brillo, or SOS pads that will rust 50 clothespins – remove from packaging. Clothes line – two 50 ft. or one 100 ft – cotton or plastic. 24 roll heavy duty trash bags – remove from box 30 to 45 gallon size 5 dust masks 2 pair disposable waterproof gloves – rubber or latex, remove from packaging 1 pair work gloves – cotton or leather, leather palms necessary Bring completed buckets to the church (or separate items) no later than November 16. We will pack and send with a team heading to Mission Central. Buckets that arrive later will be sent by another method.

# Make a whole flood bucket (like the Youth Group) OR, bring anything that goes into one and we'll build our own. THANK YOU.

As noted above checks to UMCOR are also appreciated and can be sent to the Church or placed in the offering.

### Parting thoughts:

Living in a democracy gives us a unique privilege and a profound responsibility. The privilege is the "right to vote". This right was originally only extended to white men who owned property. Later non property owners were included; later still African American men were allowed to vote; and later still the franchise was extended to women. The right to vote is often hard earned from those who hold power. Even in a democracy it takes time to get it right – and sometimes getting it right is a long and painful process. One writer once said that democracy is the worst form of government on earth - except for all the alternatives. Democracy is a slow and messy process and it is dependent on many variables. Democracy's success depends on the education and engagement of the electorate. When vast numbers of people choose to disengage or are disenfranchised democracy becomes the will of the motivated rather than the will of the people. As Christians we are called to support and pray for our leaders whether we like them or not and whether we agree with them or not. In New Testament times the Christian movement suffered severe persecution at the hands of the Roman government, yet the Christian leaders called on all Christ followers to abstain from violence, to be good citizens (thereby setting an example) and to never cease to pray for those who were in authority. Whatever happens in today's election our local, regional, state wide and national leaders are in need of our prayers. Will you remember to pray? Deciding who to vote for in a national election is a great challenge. I apply the Old Testament prophetic standard (I know that there are dozens of other ways to make this decision). The Old Testament prophets defined a good king (and therefore national leader) according to two things: 1) did they follow God's way; and, 2) did they protect and care for the poor. Obviously both are open to a wide range of interpretations but as I understand these matters it helps me to make faithful decisions on both the national and local level. How will you decide?
