Weekly Update – October 5, 2016

A Personal Word ...

"Reflecting About Faith"

In the sermon on Oct. 2, I explored the nature of faith, through Luke's description of the disciples' demand of Jesus to "Increase our faith," and Paul's second letter to Timothy in which he reminded Timothy to "rekindle the gift of God..." given him through his grandmother, Lois, and his and mother, Eunice, and affirmed in him through Paul through the "laying on of his hands."

The disciples believe that they lack the faith they need to heed Jesus' teaching to forgive a penitent brother "7 times 7" (meaning again and again). Timothy, now stepping out on his own, receives a letter from his mentor encouraging him and reminding him of the gift of faith he has already received from God through his grandmother and mother.

We are just like them. It is all too easy for us to believe we lack faith, rather than recognize the faith we have already received. Even the disciples felt they needed more faith.

We live on a world where people of faith are challenged to "prove" their faith, to show that faith "works," and to show it with mathematical certainty!

But mathematical certainty is not what the disciples or Timothy or we need. The faith they and we need is trust, confidence, and commitment to a way of life exemplified by Christ's love.

What does it mean to have faith? Here's the statement I quoted in Sunday's sermon, accompanied by references to passages in Luke's gospel (noted in parentheses).

Faith is:

- persistence in reaching out to Jesus (Luke 5:17-26)
- trusting in Jesus' power and authority (Luke 7:1-10)
- responding with love to forgiveness received (Luke 7:44-50)
- *not letting fear get the upper hand (Luke 8:22-25)*
- being willing to take risks that challenge the status quo (Luke 8:43-48)
- giving praise to God (Luke 17:11-19)
- having confidence in God's desire for justice (Luke 18:1-8)
- being willing to ask Jesus for what we need (Luke 18:35-43).
