Hi Everyone:

I love the new "Ark of the Covenant" that the FaithXpress children carried into worship on Sunday. Special appreciation to Dick Radel and Dave Mitchell for their construction assistance. The Ark of the Covenant was a symbol and a reminder in ancient Israel of God's continuing presence with the people. Inside were a few things: the tablets of stone upon which were written the Ten Commandments; a jar of manna from the wilderness; and, Aaron's rod the budded see Hebrews 9:4 (you'll have to read about all these stories in Exodus and Numbers in your Bible). The Ark was carried from camp to camp and eventually was carried to Jerusalem in the time of King David and it eventually resided in the temple built by King Solomon. There are two theories as to what happened to the Ark. One school of thought believes that the Levites hid the Ark in Egypt or Ethiopia just before Jerusalem was destroyed by King Nebuchadnezzar in 586 BC. The other school of thought believes Nebuchadnezzar captures the Ark, along with other items from the temple, and carried it back to Babylon where it was melted down for the gold plating. Our replica will serve as a reminder to all Christ followers that we live in a covenant with God through Jesus Christ that did not begin with us (nor will it end with us). It is the continuation of a covenant begun thousands of years before the birth of our savior and will continue through to the end of time.

Here is what is happening at Church:

1. Attendance last Sunday was about 130. Thank you to Mac Sabol (interim choir director) and Melanie Rodgers (interim keyboard player) for leading us in worship through the gift of music. We had a good morning learning about overcoming failure.

2. This Sunday I am preaching on dealing with Doubt. I am particularly interested in dealing with doubt that is generated by negative thinking and thinkers. I am often overwhelmed by the power of negativity in the lives of people I care about. As Christ followers we have to look to a bold and bright future. Yes, this will lead us into risk and sometimes when we take risks it won't work out as planned but the alternative is to do nothing and continue the slow deathly slide into oblivion and irrelevancy. My text this Sunday is from Numbers 13 and 14 about the 12 spies that Moses sends to inspect the Promised Land. 2 spies (Joshua and Caleb) report overcome able difficulties. 10 spies report overwhelming odds against them and a sense of utter insignificance in the face of these difficulties. These 10 convince the community to not move forward and take the risk before them. The consequence of this negativity is a generation lost wandering in the wilderness.

4. 6. FOOD PANTRY – This week bring Potato Flakes (boxed potatoes!)

7. WELL DONE: To our CROP Walkers who walked to reduce world hunger and to our "Christ Church Cupcakes" who walked to take strides against breast cancer!

8. Minister of Music Search Update: We are auditioning and interviewing 8 prospective candidates this week and expect to have an announcement in a week (October 30/31). Please keep this process in your prayers.

In the interim: Mac Sabol will be conducting the Choir and Melanie Rodgers will be playing the piano for worship at 11:00 on Sundays.

9. 4040 Property Update (the property just north of the church building on Harlem Road): Here is where are in this process. There is an Estate Sale this weekend (24-27) – feel free to wander through and take a look but the Estate Sale staff will have no information or awareness of our participation in the possible purchase of the property. On November 1 the Trustees will take a formal tour (with a certified house inspector and the chair of the Niagara Frontier District Committee on Church Building and location). We expect, following that tour, to announce a Special Church Conference to make a decision as to whether or not we will pursue purchasing the property. At a "Church" Conference every member of the Church has the right of voice and vote. A "FAQ" sheet will be made available in the next week or so with pertinent details on the property, cost, plans etc. Please keep this process in your prayers.

We will do a final count and see if we meet our goal of 300 pieces of clothing to send with the Uganda team – currently we are at 265 pieces of clothing. We could still use some colorful stickers to include in the packages. Place them in the Dress Our People mailbox in the hallway outside the church office. We will pack up the clothing on Wednesday, October 30th from 3 to 5 p.m. in the Youth Hall. **NOTE:** The Uganda Mission team will be packing their mission supplies beginning at 4:30 on October 30.

Parting Thought:

St. Paul wrote one of the most poignant and useful lines in all of the New Testament in Romans7:21. He wrote, "So I find it to be a law that when I want to do what is good, evil lies close at hand." I have learned in my 40 years on this faith journey that the easiest way to live this life is to just go with the flow and move through life in sync, as best we can, with everything else around us. On the surface this seems like a great idea until one begins to think about growth and change and improvement and other concepts like trying to make a difference. It would work great if the world were, in fact, a fair and just place. Jesus said to "enter through the narrow gate. For wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and many enter through it. But small is the gate and narrow the road the leads to life, and only a few find it (Matthew 7:13-14)." Perhaps that is what Robert Frost had in mind when he wrote about the road less travelled. I believe there is a profound human need to know significance. We need to be loved. We need to belong. And, in order to make a difference in the world, we need to risk vulnerability and the possibility of failure and even ridicule. This requires us to be brave (thank you Dr. Brene' Brown). Back to St. Paul: if I choose to not be vulnerable and to not risk and to not be placed in situations that require me to be brave I could live a long life but I doubt that it would have significance. However, when I choose that narrower and harder path I risk the possibility of struggle, failure and "evil being close at hand." The question is how will we live the life God has given us? I visit my folks at their winter place in Florida. They are surrounded by other retirees. My dad plays golf, he sings in a few choirs, he encourages ministries at home and abroad – in other words he stays engaged and strives to make a difference where and when he can. However, most of the retirees (certainly not all) have reduced themselves to early dinners and trivial pursuits. It

is an absolute waste of life experience and creative energy. Why not take the road less traveled and seek to live a life that matters? People ask me why? Why do I keep going back to Uganda? Why do I invest in trying to rebuild congregations? Why do I invest in young pastors and encourage people to get involved in making the world a better place? I have reached the simple conclusion that, though there are a lot of options on how to live this life, this is the only life I find worth living.
