

Several years ago in the midst of a race I was running along largely alone, the half-marathoners having split off a couple of miles before. These are the miles when it is easy for the mind to go to some very dark places with the body following. I had locked into a little mantra that

matched my breathing and focused on my form, to keep my core engaged which keeps my stride light and bouncy to avoid plunging into these murky recesses. I also tried as best as possible to share words of thanks with the many police who kept the roads safe for my tour around the nation's capitol, deluding myself to believing that positive encouragement might result in a positive outlook and finish. With the runners thinned to only one a minute, very few were there to cheer. Among those who were, I tried to give a thumbs-up though my hands didn't function well in the 45° steady rain conditions that dominated race day. A few clustered here and there, a small group on a corner who gave a hearty cheer and then all of the sudden I heard, "Go Pastor Daven!"

I knew that this young person was down in DC for an internship and we had corresponded about the race. But I had long since passed the major areas where spectators gathered so had not expected it. This single personal cheer carried me for miles to come. Because it reminded me of Isaiah 43:1 which reads, "I have called you by your name, you are mine." In midst of races both literal and figurative, like the race of life, we all need the occasional reminders of who we are and whose • we are. This personal cheer not only evoked the joy of someone cheering and caring for me, but the reminder of my vocation – my commit- ment to God and God ultimately cheering me toward what I am capable of accomplishing as a disciple of Jesus Christ in the race of life set before me. These prophetic words from Isaiah I was given on a small wooden plague when I graduated high school. It hung at the foot of my bed in college and occasionally I would catch the moonlight hauntingly illuminating the words. In every office I have worked in, it has been present. But it takes not the commitment of life to the vocation of ministry to know one is called, but simply the acceptance of God's love in Jesus Christ and the pledge to share that love with the world by the movement of the Holy Spirit. OUTREACH MISSIONS OF THE MONTH - APRIL 2018 Clara's Closet

Spring Cleaning? Are you looking for a place to donate your usable items that are still in good condition? Clara's Closet is a volunteer-run shop located in the basement of Central Park UMC which provides no cost shopping to refugees and people who meet the income requirements. They are accepting donations of clothing, toiletries, small household items and children's books. They are also looking for volunteers to help sort the items and help people with their selections. Please check their website for donation hours. Tax receipts are available upon request for donated items.

Family Promise

Family Promise unites faith communities in addressing the needs of the homeless. In times of crisis, Family Promise keeps families together. Volunteers working together, they provide temporary housing, meals, and services to nearly 70,000 family members annually. They mentor at-risk families, teach financial literacy, help find jobs and affordable housing, create programs to meet specific needs in their communities, and they advocate for public policies that alleviate poverty and promote the economic stability of low-income families. Generally 74% of the families are able to find long-term housing within 9 weeks of being in the program. Members of our congregation help out several times per year by providing a meal and visitation as a support congregation of St. Stephens UCC. It's a time for new life! We celebrate resurrection, renewal, and rebirth! Every human being yearns for meaning and transcendence – to rise above or beyond

the ordinary, to connect with the Divine, with one another, and to contribute to the flourishing of the world. How do we reflect this in our life together as the faith community known as Christ Church? How will we reconstitute practices that worked well in a different generation and create a space that welcomes other ways to express oneself as a person of faith? Even if these new ways die, they are a necessary part of the organism's new life. Join in the conversations and the work of renewal. God's purpose/Our purpose.



Making a difference with new pajamas and children's books!



From April 1 – May 20 we are collecting new pajamas and books for children through teens. Children who have clean pajamas and a good book to read or have read to them are more likely to have good days. Pajamas of all sizes must be new and have both a top and bottom. Books must also be new. Following Make A Difference Day on Sunday, May 20, the pajamas and books will go to Homespace and to Child & Family Services. These agencies provide services that create safe and healthy environments for children/youth and families, living at or below the poverty line, in local homes, schools, workplaces, and communities. Homespace provides a safe environment where young women/ parents (age 14-21) can learn skills to enhance themselves and their families and break the cycle of public welfare dependency. Residents receive training in job-readiness, budgeting, household management, nutrition, parenting, as well as comprehensive clinical services.

Bethel College Choir Concert—May 7


