

FROM BJ'S DESK...

I remember reading Daniel Levinson's <u>Seasons of a Man's Life</u> and Gail Sheehy's <u>Passages</u> more than 30 years ago. These books looked at the seasons and transformative moments in a person's life. Some of these moments were marked with rituals – like baptisms, birthdays, weddings, etc. – and some of them, though experienced by all of us, were less formally acknowl-

edged. While doing research for my Doctor of Ministry dissertation, I discovered several significant research projects that looked at churches the same way. The conclusion of many of the authors was similar to Levinson and Sheehy's conclusions about men and women. Many of these "church season" authors saw distinct stages of birth, growth, coming of age, decline, and death as the natural life cycle of congregations.

In most of these research projects there were noted exceptions. One of these studies looked at the life cycle and the rise and fall of English country churches. The study showed most of these congregations existing for centuries as stable or slowly declining in participation and membership. The study went on to show that for most of these congregations, at some point in their history, there was a season of rapid growth and extraordinary energy. When the researchers looked beyond the statistics to find a cause, they found that just preceding these periods of growth and activity, there had been a fire and the "old church" had burned to the ground. The community was rediscovered and energized by desperation and the community-focused task of rebuilding.

I think most North American main line protestant churches today are in the stable and slowly declining stage of a congregation's life. We are in need of a "wake up" event that would not just rebuild a building, but would re-imagine a community. Too many of us (me included) grew up in homes and a world where "going to church" was expected, assumed, and encouraged. The world around us no longer thinks that way. We can't just open the doors and expect people to flock to us. What is required is an English Country Church post-fire mentality. We need to rediscover Christian community.

Christian Community is a gathering where Jesus Christ is at the center and where every one of us has made a radical commitment to one another and the world around us. It is a community that is surrendered to prayer and works of mercy. It is a community that sees itself as a hostel, a hospital, a place of hospitality for a broken and hurting world.

What season are we in . . . what new life will we choose?

UGANDA MISSION PREPARATIONS

November 3, 2013, Kathy Weaver, Joe Forte, Rev. Clair Mosher, and Pastor BJ Norrix will travel to Uganda, East Africa, to continue our mission work there. The primary focus of this trip is to work with Nexus Seminary Uganda – a 20-course certificate-level training program designed for rural Ugandan pastors. The team will visit current and potential teaching sites, and participate in the graduation of the Kikyusa class. They will also be holding medical clinics, youth rallies, and visiting some of our schools. They will be privileged to consecrate and dedicate the new clean water supply in Nabukondo, Gomba District.

Pastor BJ will also be leading two bible scholar summits in the 17 days they are in country. To finance this, he is raising \$1000 separate from the rest of the team – if you would like to help with this next level training for our Ugandan students, please see Pastor BJ.
