

We will pass through this penitential season in the coming weeks, and eventually into Holy Week and the Great Three Days of worship on which our faith rests. This holy time is not only the climax of Lent, but of the whole Christian year. This single worship experience, spread over three days, goes by the churchy sounding word of *Tridiuum* (pronounced

TRID-oo-um) coming from a Latin term meaning three days. To truly understand and experience our faith is to participate in the reality of this unified observance beginning in the evening of Holy Thursday and concluding with sunset on Easter.

Through these days we journey in worship with Jesus from the upper room, to the cross, to the tomb, and finally to the garden. We begin on Thursday with the Maundy Thursday service, a name given to the day to recall the new commandment (mandatum novum in Latin) in John 13:34 and so appropriately named when foot-washing takes place in imitation of Jesus' actions and as a response to his new commandment to love one another. We will experience this, celebrate the new meal instituted by Christ to strengthen and sustain us, and through the stripping of the church, suffer the humiliation of Jesus. Then on Good Friday through the service of Tenebrae, meaning darkness, we walk through the final events of Jesus' life as the light is slowly extinguished candle by candle before us in our darkened worship space. Both of these days conclude in silence without benediction as a way to express that the worship continues. Then on Easter morning, the day of resurrection, that dramatic conclusion occurs in God's action of new life. As the service closes with the benediction, we are sent out to announce and to be the living examples of this Good News.

While many seek out the beauty and glory of Easter morning, few walk the entire journey. Let us put back together through our faith what we have separated by time, the one divine action of the passion, death, and resurrection of the Lord. Only then can Easter be a bursting forth of faith, opening to us the divine mystery through the One who has called us out of darkness into his own marvelous light!

With Joy...From Sally

Throughout the church's history Lent has been an observance of penitence, fasting, and atoning for sins. People who committed the "big sins" – murder, adultery, abandoning their beliefs - these sinners were

set aside from the church community for fasting and atoning for their sins and then welcomed back after Easter.

Fast forward a few years and instead of isolating sinners, the entire community received a sprinkling of ashes on their heads and were reminded that they would all return to dust. It was meant to sound worrying. In those long ago times it was almost like pronouncing a curse or a punishment on people. As if being a mortal being was a Plan B. Death is not a punishment for sins or for making bad choices. Things that are born die. It's part of life. We are mortal beings that rightly return to the earth and this is Plan A. That smudge we receive on our foreheads on Ash Wednesday is like a brush with death... one that anchors us in life. Focusing on our mortality, our humanity, with all its vulnerabilities, is an invitation to turn, to wonder at the lives we choose to live. It's an opportunity to recalibrate or refocus on who we are and who we're meant to be. It's an opportunity to come alive and consider what survives from the ashes.

John's gospel tells us what Jesus offers with these words, "I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full." Forgiveness is great, but Jesus says he came to give us *life!* Others recall Jesus also saying things like, "I am the bread of *life.*" and "Whoever believes in me... streams of *living* water will flow from within them." And, "Come to me and have *life.*" It seems to me that the life we humans live is of great importance to God, even providing us with a pattern for life in Jesus. Some people hear Jesus' offer of life and think "later" or "after" life. But eternal life means ongoing, unending, now and forever life... life that can't be taken away from us. Life that starts now. The offer is life! As we continue the Lenten journey and celebrate ongoing life on Easter, consider how God is inviting you to come alive and how your life may provide a pattern to share with others.

Walking to and through the Labyrinth at Daemen College

A labyrinth has a long history with Christian tradition. Different from a maze, a labyrinth has only one path and no dead ends. As far back as the 4th Century, they have been present on church walls and floors. Part of their usage relates to providing an alternative to pilgrimage to the Holy Land. The hope is that through the walk pilgrims would shed everything on their minds; all of their worries, fears, and concerns. Upon reaching the center, one is still and waits for illumination or healing or a sense of God's presence. Then, walking the winding way out, one feels at one with God, self, others, and nature.

The path winds throughout becoming a mirror for where we are in our lives, touching our sorrows and releasing our joys. One approaches with an open mind and an open heart. There are three stages in the walking purgation (releasing); illumination (receiving); union (returning). First, purgation is the act of shedding thoughts and distractions enabling one to let go of the details of life. It is a time to open the heart and mind. Second, illumination at the center seeks guidance. Finally, union follows the same path out with strength and clarity to find and do the work to which God has called one.

On Good Friday at 12 pm (Friday, April 19) for those able, we will walk in silence from the church to the outdoor labyrinth in front of Curtis Hall on the campus of Daemen College (Main St. & Getzville.) After walking the labyrinth at whatever pace is comfortable, each is encouraged to return in silence. For those unable to walk from the church, please join us at Daemen College where classes are not in session so parking will be open and available in front of the Thomas Reynolds Center for Special Education, the Haberman Gacioch Center for Visual & Performing Arts, or on Main St.

Tenebrae Explained

A service of Tenebrae, or Service of the Shadows /Darkness, is based on a 12th century late night/early morning service and is an extended meditation on the passion of Christ. Fourteen candles, along with a central Christ candle, are lit as the service begins; then one is extinguished at the conclusion of each section. The service ends in near darkness and silence until Easter.

We will gather at Christ Church for a service of Tenebrae at 5:30 pm on Friday, April 19.

paper towels, toilet paper, personal Hygiene products, deodorant, and soap.


The Tigers Den

Maundy Thursday Explained

This evening service commemorates the supper Jesus shared with his disciples before his crucifixion, when Jesus washed the disciples' feet and instituted the Lord's Supper. Particular traditional actions are part of this night including confession and pardon, proclamation of the Word, foot-washing, the Lord's Supper, and the stripping of the church. Foot-washing is a powerful symbolic response to the Word, dramatizing the servanthood of Jesus, both on the night before his death and in his continuing presence in our midst. The title of this day, Maundy Thursday, recalls the new commandment (mandatum novum in Latin) in John 13:34. The service may be appropriately called Maundy Thursday when foot-washing occurs in imitation of Jesus' actions and as a response to his new commandment to love one another. The ancient practice of stripping the Lord's Table and Sanctuary following communion is a vivid and dramatic way of showing the desolation and abandonment of the long night in Gethsemane and what followed. The church remains bare until Easter.

We will gather at Christ Church for Maundy Thursday worship at 7pm on April 18.
