At the end of this month, a holy fast is announced by way of Ash Wednesday (see article later in *The Caller* for meaning of Ash Wednesday.) This fast of 40 days is called Lent. This was the original time of preparation for baptism by converts to the faith which slowly became a time of penance by all

Christians. Traditionally the focus of Lent in Christianity has been prayer (justice to God,) fasting (justice to self,) and almsgiving (justice to neighbor.)

We use the period of forty days to correspond to those aspects of our spiritual past that happened in 40s. In the story of Noah, it rained for 40 days up on the mountain top; the Israelite people travel for 40 years in the wilderness before they entered the promised land; both Solomon and David were said to have reigned for 40 years; Jonah gave the city of Nineveh 40 days to repent; Jesus spent 40 days in the wilderness following his baptism to prepare for his ministry; and Jesus appeared to his disciples for 40 days following his resurrection. If we leave it in the past, however, we forget that this is our history and we are its present. We are the history of tomorrow. So, what will be the result of our 40 days? Will it merely be the absence of certain vices for this period, or will it be a new reality after we have faced the worst of it all, death itself, and then found life and devoted ourselves to justice to God, self, and neighbor? Will the chapter we write be added to all those of the past, transforming reality and establishing justice in a period of forty?

As we will hear from the prophet Joel on Ash Wednesday, "Blow the trumpet in Jerusalem! Sound the alarm on my holy mountain!
(Announce a time of fasting; call the people together for a solemn meeting. Bring everyone—the elders, the children, and even the babies)...Turn to me now, while there is time! Give me your hearts. Come with fasting, weeping, and mourning... Return to the Lord your God, for he is gracious and merciful." Let us meet together in preparation for and through these 40 days, that God may use us to write the next chapter as we "Make"

Connections and Offer Opportunities for Faith, Love, and Service."

#### **ASH WEDNESDAY EXPLAINED**

Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. Ash Wednesday emphasizes a dual encounter: we confront our

own mortality and confess our sin before God within the community of faith. The form and content of the service focus on the dual themes of sin and death in light of God's redeeming love in Jesus Christ. The use of ashes as a sign of mortality and repentance has a long history in Jewish and Christian worship, and the Imposition of Ashes can be a powerful nonverbal and experiential way of participating in the call to repentance and reconciliation. Ashes, the sign of death, are put on the forehead not in some random pattern but in the shape of a cross. This alters the starkness of the message from one of just recognition of mortality, to the immortality possible in Christ. This practice is the historic focus of Ash Wednesday observance and gave the day its name. It is traditional to save the palm branches from the previous Passion/Palm Sunday service and burn them to produce the ashes for this service.

#### **Lenten Season**

Lent is a season of repentance, fasting, and preparation for the coming of Easter. It is a time of self-examination and reflection. In the early church, Lent was a time to prepare new converts for baptism. Today, Christians focus on their relationship with God, often choosing to give up something or volunteering and giving of themselves for others. The forty days of Lent represent the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, enduring the temptation. Sundays in Lent are not counted in the forty days because each Sunday represents a "mini-Easter" celebration of Jesus' victory over sin and death.
