It is hard work; it is dirty work; it is work that seems never to have an end.

But together we can begin to make a difference, giving a glimpse of the perfection that living in God's love can provide. It may be just one little gesture and effort at a time, one little weed pulled up, but little by little comes a vision of what is possible. So as we grumble over the state of our lawns and gardens and battle against the dandelions, may we likewise work on ourselves, our relationships and our community that we may ever more reflect and faithfully be 'A Loving Church Serving A LOVING GOD!'

It seems that every day we pick up the newspaper or listen to the news we learn of yet another person who has been a leader, an inspiration, a trailblazer, an upholder of justice—people we admired, who helped shape our own living, have now been exposed for

behaviors unlike anything we would have imagined. And we're reminded that we are all humanly limited, ordinary human beings.

There were eleven of them. One of them, who was a leader among them, had denied Jesus when he needed him most. The others had all abandoned Jesus at his arrest. Sometimes, they didn't have a clue. Early Christians were sure of many aspects of their life together. They were on a learning journey. They were to be the ones who would carry: the message and the life of the kingdom community to the world. They were... humanly limited, very ordinary human beings, but they were the: "kingdom of God" for that place and time. And now...that's who we are.

Like the ones before us, we face challenges for which we have no answers. Even the rules of hospitality aren't clear to us. How will decisions be made and who will lead? These are all things that must be learned. Slowly, we learn to do new things well. We learn to defer our own opinion for the benefit of others and how to explore challenging aspects of our faith. Life is for learning, but learning doesn't just happen. There are disappointments along the way, ups and downs, discoveries and failures. We are still learning. We need one another and structure and resources to sustain our learning. The church community supports our journey with the potential of love, connection with others, forgiveness, service, and more. For all our human limitations, the church community provides a means for human flourishing that can't besustained on our own.

The book of Acts shows us the challenges and explorations of the early church, and Epistle letters describe discoveries and projects undertaken. They are evidence of learning journeys. We need look no further than the Sunday bulletin and this newsletter to see some of our learnings. "Bridges of Hope" is helping us take a fresh look at mental. health challenges and the ways we can support individuals and families as they navigate on that path. Community connections enable us to provide important information that will improve our financial decisions, provide a connecting place for middle and high school youth, and shelter
