I rarely complain about the weather at any given time, finding joy and beauty in nearly all of it. But among all the different weather phenomena, it is neither cold temperatures, nor snow, nor driving rain, nor even hazy hot and humid that rouse me to complaint, but rather the ever-present strong winds. These

seemingly endless breezes arrest me within the comfy confines of home and office. How Chicago was able to be crowned 'The Windy City' over Buffalo, I will always wonder

As the winds so howl, I try to remember that the wind is often a sign of God's presence in the Biblical narrative. In the account of the seven days of creation from the beginning of Genesis, it is wind that sweeps over the face of the waters that leads to change. At Jesus' baptism, it is the descending of the Spirit which ignites his public ministry. Spirit, in Greek, means breath or wind, both which have implications of life, movement, and change. It is this same Spirit (wind) which then leads Jesus into the wilderness and eventually back out to Galilee, forever changing his life and the lives of all those who claim his name. Is it not wind that we ourselves now experience as a source of energy with many windmills now present on our own hillsides and lakeshores? Or for those many years ago that used it to pump water giving a means for the maintenance of life itself? It is a blowing reality of change and has long also been the representation for the active presence of God. Sometimes it drives us back and sometimes it compels us forward.

Let us not simply avoid where God may be driving us back to be or compelling us forward to go by retreating into the walls of comfort and complacency, we build around ourselves. It is not a question of if the winds will blow, but whether we will allow the winds of God's grace to move and transform our lives. So let us embrace these • winds as Spirit-filled possibilities as we seek 'To Make Connections and Offer Opportunities for Faith, Love, and Service.'



Sabbatical Leave

The Lilly Endowment National Clergy Renewal Program is a grant which provides an uninterrupted, extended leave for a period of renewal and reflection to the pastor and congregation for regaining enthusiasm and creativity in ministry. After applying twice before, we have decided on one final attempt at the grant. As before, the framework and proposal will be largely unchanged from the prior years. There are some tweaks and changes we will make relative to changes between years and encouragement that this should represent, particularly for the pastor, a renewing leave undertaking activities which bring joy to help restore vitality and energy for ministry. We will post on the website a description of the program including the proposal of the nature and scope of that program which would take place largely during the summer of 2024. Questions, feedback, support, and concerns are encouraged and can be shared with Peggy Bermudez or Pastor Daven as congregational support is paramount to grant awarding.



The Future of the United Methodist Church

Moreover, becoming a Reconciling Congregation was a clear statement regarding the position of Christ Church as a welcoming and affirming faith community. Missions of the Month—March UMCOR Sunday

This special Sunday will be March 19, 2023. Through the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) we are able to make a difference in the lives of communities and individuals whose lives have been upset by storms, wars, fires, displacement, and climate change. This offering understates UMCOR's "cost of doing business," allowing UMCOR to keep the promise that 100% of any gift to a specific UMCOR project will go towards that project and not administrative costs.

Music & Meditation

Christ Church has offered a time during the seasons of Advent and Lent to quietly reflect and prepare. Currently this is a short, 30-minute, candlelight service on Friday evenings beginning at 5:30p on March 3-April 7 following the style of Taizé (prounced teh-zay'.) A Taize service is a service of song and silence, prayer, and scripture, that hopes to lead participants to contemplate and celebrate their relationship with God and with one another. Music repeats many times. It begins with a simple melody that is sung together and can remain that way, builds as it progresses, and/or employs the addition of instruments or soloist. All fit together, even if simply experiencing the music as an observer.

Ash Wednesday February 22 at 7p

Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. Ash Wednesday emphasizes a dual encounter: we confront our own mortality and confess our sin before God within the community of faith. The form and content of the service focuses on the dual themes of sin and death in light of God's redeeming love in Jesus Christ. The use of ashes as a sign of mortality and repentance has a long history in Jewish and Christian worship, and the Imposition of Ashes can be a powerful nonverbal and experiential way of participating in the call to repentance and reconciliation. Ashes, the sign of death, are put on the forehead in the shape of a cross. This alters the starkness of the message from one of just recognition of mortality, to the immortality possible in Christ. This practice is the historic focus of Ash Wednesday observance and gave the day its name. It is traditional to save the palm branches from the previous Passion/Palm Sunday service and burn them to produce the ashes for this service.
