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


CUMC "Books We Have Loved" book club

Lent is a season of repentance, fasting and preparation for the coming of Easter. It is a time of self-examination and reflection. In the early church, Lent was a time to prepare new converts for baptism. Today, Christians focus on their relationship with God, often choosing to give up something or volunteering and giving of themselves for others. The forty days of Lent represent the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, enduring the temptation. Sundays in Lent are not counted in the forty days because each Sunday represents a "mini-Easter" celebration of Jesus' victory over sin and death.

Lenten Opportunities

In addition to unique opportunities in the season of Lent, such as Music & Meditation on Fridays at 5:30 PM, Ash Wednesday, Holy Week services, and Lenten studies, we continue to maintain opportunities inperson and online in Exploring Sunday's Scriptures and online only in the form of Feasting on the Word. If you have never or simply fallen away from connecting with these short ways to enrich your faith, consider taking them on as a discipline through the season of Lent.

Ash Wednesday Explained:

Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. Ash Wednesday emphasizes a dual encounter: we confront our own mortality and confess our sin before God within the community of faith. The form and content of the service focus on the dual themes of sin and death in light of God's redeeming love in Jesus Christ. The use of ashes as a sign of mortality and repentance has a long history in Jewish and Christian worship, and the Imposition of Ashes can be a powerful nonverbal and experiential way of participating in the call to repentance and reconciliation. Ashes, the sign of death, are put on the forehead not in some random pattern but in the shape of a cross. This alters the starkness of the message from one of just recognition of mortality, to the immortality possible in Christ. This practice is the historic focus of Ash Wednesday observance and gave the day its name. It is traditional to save the palm branches from the previous Passion/Palm Sunday service and burn them to produce the ashes for this service. We are planning an Ash Wednesday service with more information coming soon!

Toilet Paper/paper products

Maundy Thursday Explained:

This evening service commemorates the supper Jesus shared with his disciples before his crucifixion, when Jesus washed the disciples' feet and instituted the Lord's Supper. Particular traditional actions are part of this night including: confession and pardon, proclamation of the Word, footwashing, the Lord's Supper, and the stripping of the church. Footwashing is a powerful symbolic response to the Word, dramatizing the servanthood of Jesus, both on the night before his death and in his continuing presence in our midst The title of this day, Maundy Thursday, recalls the new commandment (mandatum novum in Latin) in John 13:34. The service may be appropriately called Maundy Thursday when footwashing occurs in imitation of Jesus' actions and as a response to his new commandment to love one another. The ancient practice of stripping the Lord's table and sanctuary following communion is a vivid and dramatic way of showing the desolation and abandonment of the long night in Gethsemane and what followed. The church remains bare until Easter.

Music and Meditation

Christ Church has offered a time during the seasons of Lent to quietly reflect and prepare. Currently this is a short, 30-minute, candlelight service on Friday evenings beginning at 5:30 pm on 2/16, 2/23, 3/1,3/8, 3/15/3/22, following the style of Taizé (pronounced teh-zay'). A Taize service is a service of song and silence, prayer, and scripture, that hopes to lead participants to contemplate and celebrate their relationship with God and with one another. Music repeats many times. It begins with a simple melody that is sung together and can remain that way, builds as it progresses, and/or employs the addition of instruments or soloist. All this fits together, even simply experiencing the music as an observer.

Texts are short and reflective. Taizé invites one to feel and interact with the readings and songs. Prayers are invitational and conversational to promote an experience of dialogue with the living present Christ.

Silence is intentional, opportunities to wonder or to consider the words or music heard. It is combined with a sense of the living presence of God in the flickering candles.

All services are offered in-person and will be available via Live stream through our YouTube channel and archived following the conclusion of that live stream.

February 2024 - Buffalo 10 Scholarship: The Buffalo 10 Scholarship was adopted at the 2022 Upper New York Annual Conference following the racist massacre in Buffalo on May 14, 2022, and is dedicated to helping youth in identified communities of Buffalo, New York succeed in higher education. The Mission of the Buffalo



10 Scholarship is to improve educational opportunities in the zip codes adjacent to the Jefferson Avenue Tops Market (14208, 14211, 14214). Specifically, the scholarship helps youth in these areas address persisting inequities by resourcing them to complete their college education.

March 2024 - Reconciling Ministries Network: Reconciling Ministries Network ("RMN") celebrates that LGBTQ+ persons are a good expression of God's diverse creation and exists to advocate for the affirmation of all of God's children in the Church and the work. RMN is committed to intersectional justice across and beyond the United Methodist connection, working for the full participation of all LGBTQ+ people throughout the life and leadership of the Church. Christ Church Amherst became a reconciling congregation in 2022 and this offering is part of our commitment to RMN.

AN UPDATE FROM CHURCH COUNCIL **Dreams for 2024 and Beyond**

Church Council is working hard on following up on our congregation-wide dreams session from September. Leadership has taken a serious look at all suggestions, and we realized that we needed to focus on concrete tasks we can complete now, as opposed to changes that are merely aspirational. As such, a small team is meeting to discuss how we can go "back to basics," leaning into our identity as a reconciling congregation practicing radical hospitality. Further, we are in the process of becoming designated as a Safe Haven Congregation by the UNY Conference, which will allow us to specifically attract new members who are members of United Methodist churches that are disaffiliating from the denomination, but who wish to remain United Methodist and are looking for a new Church home. Additionally, a small group will meet to discuss ways to connect with lay leadership of other United Methodist congregations in the area to encourage collaboration. Please let Pastor Daven, Peggy Bermudez, or Brad Loliger know if you would like to be part of these groups or if you have any questions. We are hopeful that the changes in our denomination can be seen as an opportunity for growth and a stronger Church in the future!

We hope to lean into our identity as a reconciling congregation and present ourselves as a Safe Haven Congregation for United Methodists who are looking for a new church home. Stay tuned for more information!

Walking the Labyrinth at Daemen College

A labyrinth has a long history with Christian tradition. Different from a maze, a labyrinth has only one path and no dead ends. As far back as the 4th-century, they have been a present on church walls and floors. Part of their usage relates to providing an alternative to pilgrimage to the Holy Land. The hope is that through the walk pilgrims would shed everything on their mind; all of their worries, fear and concerns. Upon reaching the center, one is still and waits for illumination or healing or a sense of God's presence. Then, walking the winding way out, one feels at one with God, self, others, and nature.

The path winds throughout becoming a mirror for where we are in our lives, touching our sorrows and releasing our joys. One approaches with an open mind and an open heart. There are three stages in the walking purgation (releasing); illumination (receiving); union (returning). First, purgation is the act of shedding thoughts and distraction enabling one to let go of the details of life. It is a time to open the heart and mind. Second, illumination at the center seeks guidance. Finally, union follows the same path out with strength and clarity to find and do the work to which God has called one.

All are encouraged to walk the outdoor labyrinth in front of Curtis Hall on the campus of Daemen College (Main St. & Getzville).



As we continue to search for ways to be better Stewards of God's world, consider these things you might adopt as we head into a New Year with new possibilities:

Junk Mail accounts for 41 pounds/person every year; 80-100 million trees lose their lives to print junk mail and much of it ends up in landfills. To opt out of Advertisements go to DMAchoice.org; it costs \$4 to remove 80% of the mail. For Credit Card/Insurance offers go to OptOutPrescreen.com; free for a 5yr. opt-out or you can fill out a short form for a permanent opt-out. CatalogChoice.org allows you to choose any company in their extensive list and a letter to opt-out will be sent on your behalf, so now work on your part!

Positively Green Cards are made from recycled material, printed with soy ink and manufactured using green power; the company also donates 10% of their profits to organizations that care for the environment.

We are moving into another volatile election year - support those who work for good, encourage family and friends to do the same, then most importantly VOTE.

Hot food containers or drink cups made of Styrofoam leach Styrene and Benzene, both known Neurotoxins and suspected Carcinogens; demand and use alternatives such as glass, ceramic, aluminum and even multi-use plastic ware. Speak up for your health and the health of the environment!

Lastly, consider purchasing clothing from a Thrift on Second-Hand store; it uses fewer resources, generates fewer emissions and less waste, gives other people work, extends the life of the garment, and keeps textiles out of landfills. (Remember textile recycling also works.)
