
Too often we leave our faith at Easter. We stand outside the tomb and celebrate God's incredible act of love which forgives and the moments of grace where Christ is visible before us. But whether intentional or not, we fail to allow the gift of the Holy Spirit to fill us, move us, and lead us from there. We are frozen from moving beyond what is to what should be and what can be by God's grace.

Perhaps like the disciples, who overcome by fear were held up and held back in Jerusalem after the resurrection, it is a fear that paralyzes us from I moving beyond. To live by this faith, pro- claiming this reality, would undoubtedly mean changing lives as it did in theirs. It upsets the status quo and calls into question many of the prevailing policies and practices. But through the time leading up to Pentecost, the disciples continued to gather for worship, to pray seeking out guidance, and to synthesize the teachings of Christ. Then, despite their fear, filled with the breath of God they began to proclaim God's love and forgiveness. It is the language of resurrection they speak – the language of Truth and victory of love and goodness. And such language as that is, indeed, universal. Speaking out against evil and injustice and oppression and speaking for what is right and good and just and loving is something all can hear and understand. Yes, this will mean change in and to our lives. Yes, it will mean speaking out against what is and working actively towards what can be. The gift of I the Holy Spirit is a gift of action and reaction to injustice in our churches, in our schools, in our governments, in our policies, in our nations, in our world. It is a commitment to work to create equity through policies and practices that are fair for all. It is the willingness not only to say and personally show, but to actively engage and do.

We all know that the world does not reflect the God of love which we celebrate in Jesus Christ and are led by in the Holy Spirit. Too many profit and gain off of practices and policies that are unfair and unjust. Some are filled, while others hunger; some have an abundance, while others have nothing. But just because that is the way things are does not mean that it is the way it should be, has to be, or always will be. We are gifted and graced with the Holy Spirit to speak up and speak out, to let God's breath fill our lungs and the winds of God's change compel us forward. Because, after all, we are a resurrection people who not only pray but believe that earth can and will truly reflect heaven!

Did you know?

Polystyrene (Styrofoam) is difficult to recycle both because recycling facilities aren't commonplace and you can't make it into new high-quality polystyrene.

Recycling one ton of paper saves **7,000 gallons of water, three cubic** yards of landfill and **4,100** kilowatt hours of electricity.

You should re-use containers to reduce waste; the average child's school lunch generates **67 pounds of packaging waste over a year.**

Batteries can cause serious harm to human health and the environment when disposed of with municipal solid waste. Many companies and retailers will take your old batteries and properly dispose of them or have them recycled. (Home Depot, Lowe's, and Staples are required by NYS law to recycle certain batteries they sell; UB collects alkaline batteries which are the most commonly used: 1 Diefendorf Hall 220 Winspear Avenue.)

Twenty- six recycled PET plastic bottles equals a polyester suit; five recycled PET bottles make enough fiberfill to stuff a ski jacket!

According to US EPA about **40% of heavy metals** including lead, mercury and cadmium in landfills come from electronic equipment and discards. Some towns have curbside electronics pick-up and Erie County has collections at times throughout the year. Check with your town to see what they offer.

The US uses **100** billion plastic bags annually consuming about **12** million barrels of oil. Less than 1% of plastic bags are ever recycled. Reusable bags can help reduce the number of plastic bags you use. Wegman's stores recycle clean paper-free bags, packaging material and others; check their website for details.

According to the EPA, twenty percent of what goes into landfills is food. If you've got some small outdoor space, consider starting a compost bin or see if there are community options nearby to drop off your inedible scraps and peelings. Some towns have already created drop-off locations: Farmer Pirate Compost website will give you details, so consider this when you are dreaming of new ways to be good stewards of God's world.
