

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

In the ritual of baptism which we were reminded of recently through the baptism of Aubrey Loliger, parents are asked at one point, "Will you nurture this child in Christ's holy Church, that by your teaching and example they may be guided to accept God's grace for

themselves . . . " In other words, would our children through what we * say and do be able to see and know God? Jesus says in John 13:34, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I • have loved you, you also should love one another." To explore that question of the baptismal ritual another way, do our lives through what we say and do express and share the same love that Jesus had for us through what he said and did? If you are anything like me, you answer with a "Heaven's no! My life as an expression of God's love still needs a lot of work." Thankfully John Wesley certainly understood this reality seeing perfection, that is our lives being a perfect reflection of the love • of God, as virtually unobtainable in this life. Rather our lives are spent growing in holiness of heart and life ever closer to that reflection, a process called sanctification. So, the pledge of my life in its teaching and example is more truly a commitment to this process—recognizing * that I have a long way to go, but will do all I can to reach it. While we are reminded of the gift of the Holy Spirit, we are left with • the challenge—will everyone know that we are Christ's disciples because of our love for one another? Can our children see God in us and through us? Do we as parents, grandparents, aunts and uncles, friends, and neighbors reflect through our teaching and example the love of God? Let us gather and grow committing ourselves to the process that the answer may become ever more clearly a resounding 'yes' and 'amen' as we live our vision of "Making Connections and Offering Opportunities in faith, love, and service."

Lenten Season

Lent is a season of repentance, fasting, and preparation for the coming of Easter. It is a time of self-examination and reflection. In the early church, Lent was a time to prepare new converts for baptism. Today, Christians focus on their relationship with God, often choosing to give up something or volunteering and giving of themselves for others. The forty days of Lent represent the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, enduring the temptation. Sundays in Lent are not counted in the forty days because each Sunday represents a "mini-Easter" celebration of Jesus' victory over sin and death.



Maundy Thursday / Tenebrae Explained:

This evening service commemorates the supper Jesus shared with his disciples before his crucifixion, when Jesus washed the disciples' feet and instituted the Lord's Supper. Particular traditional actions are part of this night including: confession and pardon, proclamation of the Word, foot washing, the Lord's Supper, and the stripping of the church. The title of this day, Maundy Thursday, recalls the new commandment (mandatum novum in Latin) in John 13:34. The ancient practice of stripping the Lord's table and sanctuary following communion is a vivid and dramatic way of showing the desolation and abandonment of the long night in Gethsemane and what followed. Tenebrae, or "darkness," is based on a twelfth-century late night/early morning service and is an extended meditation of the passion of Christ. Gradually the worship space grows darker alongside the extinguishing of candles representing the apostles abandoning Christ, with the final reading done in near complete darkness to reflect the shadows of sin / evil in the world. A single candle returns to the space as a symbol of Christ, representing the light of hope amidst darkness. Good Friday

Good Friday will continue the offerings of Music & Meditation for 30 minutes beginning at 5:30 PM with the readings aligning with the focus of Good Friday on the way of the cross with the candlelit contemplative setting ideal for this introspective holy time.

Walking the Labyrinth at Daemen University

A labyrinth has a long history with Christian tradition. Different from a maze, a labyrinth has only one path and no dead ends. As far back as the 4th-century, they have been present on church walls and floors. Part of their usage relates to providing an alternative to pilgrimage to the Holy Land. The hope is that through the walk pilgrims would shed everything on their mind; all of their worries, fear, and concerns. Upon reaching the center, one is still and waits for illumination or healing or a sense of God's presence. Then, walking the winding way out, one feels at one with God, self, others, and nature.

The path winds throughout becoming a mirror for where we are in our lives, touching our sorrows and releasing our joys. One approaches with an open mind and an open heart. There are three stages in the walking - purgation (releasing); illumination (receiving); union (returning). First, purgation is the act of shedding thoughts and distraction enabling one to let go of the details of life. It is a time to open the heart and mind. Second, illumination at the center seeks guidance. Finally, union follows the same path out with strength and clarity to find and do the work to which God has called one. All are encouraged to walk the outdoor labyrinth in front of Curtis Hall on the campus of Daemen University (Main St. & Getzville.)

The End of Lent:

Certain years by the nature of the calendar yield unique challenges to the faithful. With the celebration of the resurrection happening so late, we spend the majority of the month of April in the season of Lent. As our natural world undergoes its own rebirth, we are to hold ourselves in the season of Lent. Yet it is imperative that we do exactly that, remain in Lent especially through Holy Week. This time (the scriptures, the worship, and the spiritual disciplines) is a door opened to us annually so we may experience fully the splendor of Christ's Kingdom, have the foretaste of the eternal joy which awaits us, and the glory of the victory which is already and fills the whole of creation. This is the time when we approach and will finally, once again, pass into new life with Christ. But we cannot pass through this door without journeying completely through Lent. The purpose of spiritual disciplines through Lent, of fasting from something, is to remind us in our deprived/hungry state that we rely upon something else. We ask what this 'something' through the corresponding question of 'on what does our life depend?' As we hunger, we experience Christ and are liberated from dependence on food, matter, and the world. We are then left with only a hunger for God. Only God has life and is Life.


75th Anniversary Celebration of CUMC

Christ Church UWF Is gathering used Crayons for **The Crayon Initiative**. The Crayon Initiative was born one night when Bryan Ware and his family went out for dinner. While his boys sat coloring on the menu, he couldn't help but wonder where restaurant crayons end up, when all the people go home.

Turns out, it's the landfill—making a big waxy mess that never biodegrades. Why, Bryan thought, couldn't they be re-purposed to create more joy in the world? He took the crayons home and got busy—figuring out the art of collecting and sorting old crayons, melting them down, and remanufacturing them in a bright, clean, paper-free form. Consulting an occupational therapist, he even gave his new crayons a unique design—large and three-sided, not round—so they're easy for kids to grip and can't roll off hospital trays.

Finally, he crafted a network for sending free crayons to kids in hospitals all over the country. Studies show that art therapy can reduce heart rates, improve cognition, release endorphins and alleviate stress. And most young patients take the crayons home with them as the happiest part of their stay. John R. Oishei Children's Hospital in Buffalo participates in the Crayon Initiative.

STEWARDSHIP TEAM

In honor of Earth Day celebrated April 22nd and May Day generally celebrated May 1st, we offer these special ways in which to renew our promise to care for this wonderful planet we all call home:

Choose native plants and other perennials when shopping for your garden needs. The more you plant this year the less you will need to buy in the future; butterflies, bees, birds, other pollinators and your budget will be very happy!

In rainy weather it's easy to forget the long dry spells caused by climate change. Look for ways to conserve water such as setting up a Rain Barrel, (we have flyers if you want to explore this option) planting tea bags with your flowers and veggies to hold moisture longer and "donating" leftover pet water to your plants.

Consider buying a backyard composter where you can deposit those pesky fruit and vegetable skins and other unusable/forgotten/spoiled foods (except animal protein) and garden waste such as grass clippings, dried leaves etc. Food waste is a major contributor to methane which spurs climate change and only adds to overwhelmed landfills.

Consider participating in your Town's opportunities to volunteer to clean up designated areas on Earth Day; the local Bee usually has these listed closer to the actual day. Otherwise contact your Town Supervisor or Highway Dept. You'll meet other like-minded folks, help improve your mood and maybe even burn a few extra calories........ always good, right?

Message from Finance Committee Chair

Congregational Members,

On behalf of the finance team I wanted you to have a clear picture of 2024. We lost several church members in 2024 and that impacted the contributions that the Church received. We ended the year with a positive bottom line of \$1,985. Contribution income totaled \$209,488. Income from all sources totaled \$251,719. A significant effort was made by our Pastor to reduce the work hours of staff, and the Trustees did everything possible to keep our building expenses on budget. The cost of utilities and insurances continue to increase each year. The audit of our financial records for 2024 has been completed with no exceptions noted.

All of our committees did their share by watching expenses along the way. Despite a tight year financially we should be proud of the contributions we made to several mission related organizations. Our Christmas offering and second Sunday offerings have helped numerous organizations provide services to the greater community.

2025 will no doubt provide us with additional challenges, but through the annual pledge process and other gifts received, we will continue to make an impact well beyond our walls. I want to thank the members of the Finance Committee and other supporters including the folks who count the offerings each Sunday. We have a committed team who are fully committed to the mission and values of our church.
